FAREWELL ADDRESS: EXTRAORDINARY IS THE NEW ORDINARY

This is the last newsletter article that will appear under the byline "Steve Tepper, Board President." I have mixed feelings about the end of my two years of service as President of this wonderful congregation. It has truly been a pleasure, an honor and an amazing experience, but it will also be nice to have some free time for other pursuits both within and outside of congregational life.

I would like to claim that the past two years have been extraordinary, but it seems like our brief history is filled with extraordinary periods. When the extraordinary always happens, it starts to become ordinary. So here is the incredible, ordinary story of our journey together these last two years:

In 2009, we held Sunday services in an elementary school cafeteria, had a small business office, and searched western Broward every time we needed a large meeting space Sunday afternoon or any other day of the week. Today, we have our own space for worship, meetings, concerts, fundraisers, religious education classes, and pretty much anything else we want to do. And our flaming chalice is no longer powered by double A batteries!

In 2009, we had a budget deficit of more than \$130,000. This year we expect to book an operating *surplus* of \$30,000. This means we were able to fund the entire cost of our move and build-out with operating revenue and gifts and pledges from members, without dipping into our savings.

In 2009, very few visitors were finding us, and even fewer were following the pathway to membership. In our new home, we have new visitors every week, many with children, we have already held two Pathways to Membership classes, and we are planning to recommence regular New Member Sundays.

In 2009, our congregation was deeply divided over many issues, and love and trust seemed to be in short supply. Today, we are a much healthier congregation, with a shared vision of our mission and our future.

But not all the changes have been positive. Some of the steps back that we have taken are reminders of the work we still have to do:

Balancing our budget came at a high price, as we made many painful staffing cuts and became a lay-led congregation. Some of that has been positive in the short-run, as we have enthusiastically taken re-

sponsibility for defining our ministries. But it's hard to imagine we will be content to continue lay-led for many more years, or have the energy to do so.

We also lost most of our young adult members as we struggled with decisions regarding our capital fund, and eliminated staff positions. I don't know about you, but I look at every young adult who joins us and wonder if I am seeing next year's committee chair, a future Board member, maybe a future president. After all, we old-timers can't keep it going forever. I am encouraged that so many young adults and young families have visited us since our move and hopeful that the trend will continue.

One thing I have no mixed feelings about is the quality of the leadership to whom I hand over the reins on June 30. Marjie and the new Board are filled with the fire of enthusiasm, creativity and a deep love of our congregation. Please give them your hands and your hearts and your trust, as you have so graciously done for me these last two years, and let us all look forward to the next two years, secure in the knowledge that they will be extraordinary.

Remember the dream we had? You know, to have our own space to love and to cherish – and to share. What? Share? Absolutely.

Now that we have our own space, we need to start sharing it. Besides being an economic necessity (we need additional income to meet our budget), we want to share our wonderful space with others so that they can get to know us. As the saying goes: "There are a lot of people out there who are UUs but don't know it yet." If we do not share, those UUs in the making will not have the opportunity to find out more about us – including where we are located. Now, this doesn't mean we get pushy, but we just need to get our name out there! There are folks just waiting to hear about the good news of Unitarian Universalism.

So, yes, now is the time for all of us to do a little promotion. Do you belong to a club or a craft group that

might need a regular meeting space? Is someone planning a small wedding? Or perhaps a tutoring space might be needed? If so, please be sure to mention our very own River of Grass facility.

Here are some of the points of interest (aka our selling points):

- We can handle up to 150 people in the hall
- We have tables and chairs on site
- We have a kitchen which a caterer can use as a staging area
- We have a convenient location
- We have ample free parking
- We have clean, modern bathrooms
- And you have to admit it looks pretty good, too!

For smaller space requirements, the multi-purpose room can accommodate tables and chairs for up to 25 to 30 people. There's a television with a DVD player and whiteboards – all ready to use. For a very small meeting, the teen room can hold up to 10 people and is equipped with a television and DVD player. If small children need to be cared for, we have a nursery room.

Kitchen privileges can be arranged for small or large groups.

Of course, first and foremost, renters will want to know the cost. Many groups are non-profit and would like to use space at no cost. And, as much as we would like to offer this community service, this is not a viable strategy at this time. However, the good news is that we can (probably) meet or beat the cost of similar facilities in the area. (Cost is an area that we are working hard to define and finalize.)

We must remember, also, that once we start renting out our facility, we need to address the issue of access. Someone either has to let users in and lock up afterwards, or (for recurring rentals) we can provide a key (with a key deposit fee). Also, renters would need to know that they are responsible for cleaning and returning the space to us in good condition at the end of an event (or they could hire a service). We, at River of Grass, are experts at being "good" renters after years of setting up and taking down worship space, auctions, Christmas Eve services, and Seders at other facilities. We know that part really well.

Finally, we need volunteers! In the next few weeks, we need to develop a brochure, get information ready for our website, and show the facility to potential renters. If you have experience with renting facilities, your advice is needed! In fact, help with all aspects of running our facility is needed, so please don't be bashful. Step up – you are needed. Let's travel down this exciting new path together.

TREASURER'S TIDBITS

As of April 30, 2011:

- The balance in the TD Ameritrade account was \$626,223.61.
- The balance in the Operating Account was \$51,037.82.
- The balance in the Benevolences Account was \$3,264.95

Note: The Benevolences Account was previously called the Minister's Fund and used at the discretion of the minister for special requests. The Board has not determined an appropriate and confidential procedure to disburse these funds. So for the time being, this account is inactive.

Our PayPal account continues to be useful. There were 14 tickets for the Marc Hansen concert purchased through PayPal.

Capital Fund Corporation has established an account with Northstar, our financial planners, and \$500,000 from our TD Ameritrade account was transferred to that account before the Annual Meeting on May 22nd.

This congregation continues its generosity with our outreach. \$772 was collected and sent to the Mid-South District Storm Relief Fund from a special collection. Our monthly contributions to LifeNet 4 Families have averaged \$500 per month.

DEFICIT REDUCED AT ANNUAL MEETING By Bev Kaufman

A bare-bones budget got whittled down even more at the May 22nd annual meeting as the congregation agreed to do without a paid part-time Faith Development assistant for another year, thus cutting more than \$8.000 off the budget. A further savings of \$3,000 was made when Gayle Giese agreed to take on half of the Pianist's workload but to return her stipend as a donation.

Finally, the income side of the budget sheet was pushed up another \$5,600 as members increased their pledges, allowing the congregation to shaved the deficit to a little under \$12,000, down from a projected \$28,000 at the start of the meeting.

One cost-saving measure that did not survive was a move to eliminate the position of part-time Office Administrator (\$23,792). Members argued successfully that volunteers filling in since the position was vacated were facing burnout, and that the duties were better handled by a professional.

The congregation also approved the uncontested election of officers, including one who hadn't been on the ballot. At the start of the meeting, Treasurer Kathy Jens-Rochow announced that she was resigning effective June 30. Janet Schwartz was elected to fill the remainder of her term.

Other officers elected were: Marjorie Loring, President; Ken Bresnahan; Vice-President; Susan Juncosa, Secretary; Trustee (twoyear), Diane Diaz and Grant Basham; Trustee (one-year), Deb Giblin-Davis.

Also elected were Riley Cothran, Gayle Giese, and Audrey Stang to next year's Nominating Committee. Paige Giese was elected as Youth Representative to the Board at the Young Religious Unitarian Universalists meeting last month. Steve Tepper will remain on the Board as Past President for one year.

At the Capital Fund Board meeting that followed immediately after, Rob Giblin-Davis was elected as a Trustee of the Board.

She is a lieutenant. in the Colombian Army Reserve. She has been married to Daniel Csvany for eleven years (the same amount of time she has been living in Florida); they have three-year old twins, a boy and a girl, and three cats.

Although raised "kind of Catholic," Katrin really sounds like the rest of us who feel we have been Unitarian Universalists all our lives. "I always had a great interest in the different religions of the world." she says. "That and my twins are the reasons we joined River of Grass. I want my kids to get a more global education about religion rather than just focusing on one. And being taught the importance of respecting the different spiritual pathways people take. I think Unitarian Universalism and this congregation is the perfect match for us."

The Returnees

Deb and Jon Kitner, charter members, have been so eloquent in expressing their feelings on returning, that we have decided to quote them directly.

Jon: "About a year ago, I decided to leave River of Grass to join a Congregational church, thinking that it would provide a more focused community where I could grow into my faith amongst people who shared my Christian values and vision. The dogma was killing me! How could I think that I could walk out of my UU experiences of the past 35 years and take on another religious identity?

"Those who have known me at River of Grass know that I am outspoken and passionate about my own spiritual journey. But I didn't know myself very well. What I found out was that any kind of religious dogma kills the very spirit that it claims to nurture. Most importantly, I came to realize that River of Grass is a sacred community because it does NOT espouse a religious dogma!

"I came to realize how precious such a community is only when I found myself inside a community that blindly accepted dogma. So I have rejoined ROG (and the Unitarian Universalists Church of Fort Lauderdale) and will never leave again. Just think of me as the 'returning, prodigal elder.""

Deb, while more succinct than Jon, expresses feelings just as heartfelt: "I am delighted to be back to my real church home, River of Grass. Even though we met some wonderful people at the Congregational church and the minister there is an amazing, gifted person, we missed River of Grass more and more as time went by. We have a new appreciation for Unitarian Universalism and were very happy to be welcomed back so warmly!"

MY SPIRITUAL JOURNEY By Vickie Koutoulas, Membership Co-Chair

My Spiritual Journey began twenty-three years ago when I began my quest for the perfect church to attend. I had been raised a Greek Orthodox since both my parents were of Greek descent. I found the Greek language difficult to comprehend since my parents always spoke English in our home, and it was frustrating not to be able to understand what the priest was saying. As a child, I found the large paintings of the saints in the church to be intimidating, and I didn't care for the rituals and incense.

When my children were pre-schoolers, I decided that it would be nice to belong to an English-speaking congregation. I sought out the Presbyterian church, but always felt that I

was somewhat different because I was an "ethnic." I attempted to fit in, became a Sunday School teacher, enjoyed the family potlucks and the friendships I shared with a few other teachers. I found the services were inspiring to a young mother who was working hard raising a gifted child and a set of twins. And the minister was very comforting when my father suddenly passed away. But as time went by, I realized that I really didn't fit in at this place either.

Disappointed, I decided to continue my search for the perfect place of worship. Shortly, thereafter, my family moved to Cooper City, a neighboring town, and I decided to join the local Methodist Church. The Methodists were sincere and polite but very conservative. Though I remained there for several years and enjoyed working in the nursery as well as attending services, I felt that something was missing.

It was time to move on and I was encouraged by several friends to visit a neighboring Christian church. The minister there was a motivational speaker and was very interesting. There was a lot about self-help and teaching people how to live a better life. But I soon realized that my values were much more liberal than theirs were. During one of the sermons, the minister encouraged us to "Vote our Values" which I felt was encouraging the congregation to vote conservatively. I was turned off immediately because I've always believed in the separation of church and state.

Luckily, for me, my mother had introduced my family to the Unitarian Fellowship of South Florida in Hollywood, FL, and we began to attend regularly. I visited frequently and enjoyed the services immensely and realized that I was Unitarian at heart. I had worked as a social worker and always felt the desire to help disadvantaged people. My mother had always taught us that it was our responsibility to help the poor people.

GREEN TIP

Want to clean your oven? Instead of using a commercial spray with large amounts of toxic chemicals, like Sodium hydroxide or lye, try citrus oil, a plant based solvent; a paste of water and baking soda [let is stand overnight, then scrub it off]; apply a spray of warm water, 2 tbs. of liquid soap and 2 tsp. of borax, allow to sit, and then scrub it off; or soak difficult areas with vinegar for two

hours and then wipe off. Greenlivingtips.com says, "It's likely that the earth-friendly methods will take a little more elbow grease than the heavy-duty chemical products, but minimizing negative impact on the environment and reducing health risks is a good consolation." - *Submitted by Steve Jens-Rochow*
