Peter Morales, President of our denomination, participated in non-violent civil disobedience and was arrested while protesting Arizona's anti-immigrant legislation, SB 1070, in July 2010. Just recently, on August 5th, 2011, he was found guilty of misdemeanor charges stemming from his protest to support human rights for all.

Rev. Morales states, "My conviction as a result of that civil disobedience in no way alters my commitment to opposing this legislation that targets and dehumanizes some of the most vulnerable among us. The [Unitarian Universalist Association] is a faith community of more than 1,000 congregations that bring to

the world a vision of religious freedom, tolerance and social jus-

tice." We are one of those "more than 1,000 congregations." Therefore, we should strive to bring to our local community and beyond that "vision of religious freedom, tolerance, and social justice." Thank you, Rev. Morales, for leading with conviction. At River of Grass, we too, stand on the side of love – and justice. We will do our best to bring that vision out into our world.

# BOARD MATTERS

The new Board of Trustees met for the first time this year on August 10. The focus of the meeting, unsurprisingly, was the upcoming year. It's going to be busy!

The Board approved Judi Oltman's request to open the Bingo night auction event to the general public after a discussion of the reasons, nature of publicity, facility requirements for the evening, supervision of children and payment methods.

Deb Giblin-Davis came to discuss the feasibility of using River of Grass as a distribution point for an organic food club. Deb has been running a club at her house for the past two years and has been researching and communicating with others who do this. After discussion of the time, space and participants, it was asked that Deb return with a plan of action including the proposed organizational structure upon which the Board could vote. Deb agreed to do so.

Janet Schwartz summarized the work the Hub task force has done to ready and move us into our home. She also presented an overview of the remaining funds and proposals received to complete the build-out.

The question arose from the Faith Development Committee as whether or not charging for classes was required. Discussion and review identified this as past practice which was not required. The Board therefore stated that the decisions about charging a fee for classes was up to the Faith Development Committee and that the Board would support their decision. It was recommended that donations be solicited to cover the proposed budget income item.

Tom Robinson and Ken Bresnahan were nominated to attend SUULI, the Southeast UU Leadership Institute, in February.

The annual Board retreat was scheduled for Saturday, October 8th.

# EXCITING SCHOOL YEAR CURRICULUM OUTLINED

Our new Faith Development school year has begun! If you have been part of our religious education program before, welcome back. If you are new to River of Grass: welcome!

We are looking forward to an exciting year, our first in our new home, with "real" classrooms, an official "teen room," and our own space where we can have special events, youth sleepovers and so many other things. Blessings to all of you for your patience with the times we had to host fundraisers for field trips in a school cafeteria and have class on a picnic table. Isn't it amazing to finally be here?

We are proud to have offered religious education in our congregation since we chartered more than a decade ago. Our program, at this point, is completely run by volunteers. So we really could use your help if we put out a call for party hosts, service project leaders and fill-in teachers throughout the year. We promise you will have a great time with our River of Grass kids, as well as having an active part in growing our faith by nurturing young UUs.

T he first day of the Faith Development year began on Aug. 28, with teachers and students getting to

know each other. There will be classes on Labor Day weekend Sunday, Sept. 4. That Sunday also will be our first River of Grass youth group meeting during service time, which begins at 10:30am. Youth group is open to all high school students and their friends outside the congregation as well.

# OTHER HIGHLIGHTS OF THE NEW SCHOOL YEAR

- e will have four separate classes: Pre-school, elementary school, middle school and high school. Our line-up for the beginning of the year:
- Pre-school students will be getting a head start on spiritual questing via the works of Dr. Seuss;
- Elementary school students will be looking at core UU and human values through the "Faithful Journeys" curriculum;
- Middle school students will discover some hidden messages in one of nation's favorite cartoon shows in "The Gospel According to the Simpsons;"

• High school students will find out it's easy to be green through "The Story of Stuff" sessions. Class offerings change in 2012.

we class time this year is 10:45am. Students are asked to go into service with their families at 10:30am, allowing them to experience the opening rituals of our worship every week. They then will be dismissed to classes. Class will adjourn at 11:45am, giving parents a bit of kid-free time during fellowship hour. Parents either must come to the classrooms and pick up their children, or wait for them to be escorted out by teachers. No children will be let out unescorted as class ends.

A lso new this year: The high school youth group will meet on the first Sunday of every month during regular class time. High school students also will attend full service on the fourth Sunday of every month. This schedule may fluctuate in order to allow older students to attend the services that most interest them. Parents will be kept informed of the schedule.

Welcome, welcome by name, introduce people to individuals (no mass greetings which are just embarrassing to the tentative and shy). If you say you're friendly, be so. If you are welcoming, welcome. If love is a core teaching, love your guests.

"Anxious times are when we most notice the need for a beloved community. Somehow amid our own anxiety, we need to find the grace to minister. It's easier if we all practice the humble art of hospitality. Exercise our faith, hold one another gently and speak truth to power. May your ministry make a difference."

May we make it so.
