TEENS LEARN IMPORTANT LIFE LESSONS IN OWL CLASSES By Diane Lade, Faith Development Co-Chair

Let's talk about sex – in our place of worship? But that's what some of our teens are doing in the Our Whole Lives (OWL) sexuality and spirituality class that began last month. Offered on a regular basis through the Faith Development program, OWL has been a proven favorite with our youth for years. We have 11 students this year in OWL I, including some from families outside our congregation whose teens are friends with River of Grass kids. We welcome them!

Why should Unitarian Universalist congregations get involved with sex education? Because OWL is about so much more than anatomy, AIDS and sexual risks – important topics, of course, that do get covered in public schools. But OWL teens also explores ethical decision making, learning respect for one's self and others, political aspects of sexuality and building healthy relationships of all sorts, not just intimate ones. The OWL approach affirms UU values while giving teens information they need to be healthy and safe.



The OWL series was developed jointly by the Unitarian Universalist Association and the United Church of Christ, initially as a response to the decline of sexuality education in schools. It is a lifespan series, with programs that begin in elementary school and run through adulthood. While OWL promotes UU values such as responsibility and respect, it is not connected to any faith and the material is not religious.

Teachers must be certified to teach any OWL sessions. River of Grass is fortunate to have trained teachers for middle

school, high school and adult OWL, and we have offered classes for all of these age groups in the past. Faith Development also is fortunate to have the River of Grass board and OWL parents' support that is allowing us to rent a private space on Sundays in a temple located in our center, so our students can speak freely (and be noisy, as OWL is fun!) without disturbing our other classes on Sunday morning.

OWL runs through the end of May. There will be no middle school Faith Development classes the rest of the congregational year, as all of those teens are taking OWL. Visiting youth will be invited to join the high school class. Elementary and pre-school classes will continue as usual.

There will be no Sunday school classes for any grades on Sunday, March 11 and March 18, due to spring break.

Also: Please say hello to Tatiana Acero, our new childcare provider. She will taking care of our littlest ones in the nursery and assisting the hospitality team. This section lists small projects which have been identified by committees or small groups. If you have the expertise and time and want to lend a helping hand, one of these may be for you!

River of Grass held its first Empty Bowls workshop on February 25, making bowls and other works of art as part of the Empty Bowls/Stone Soup project to fight hunger. The next step will be the glazing of the bowls on March 11 after services, followed by the annual Stone Soup Lunch on March 25. All proceeds go to Broward County's LifeNet4Families.



BOARD MATTERS

I twas a dark and stormy night when seven Board members gathered around a table. The lone candle flickered and threatened to go out along with the lights....alright, alright. It was an unseasonably warm February evening (which did get dark!) when the Board met on February 8 in the well-lit Multipurpose Room to consider things the Board considers worth considering.

One of the things considered was the success of the Mid-Year Congregational Meeting. Fifty-five members stayed after service on Sunday, February 5th, and had a mini-tailgate potluck lunch. They then received updates on the status of the yearly budget, possible future ministerial options and the results of last fall's Envisioning Day, and then voted to support the Unitarian Universalist Association's Action of Immediate Witness (presented by the Service and Social Justice Committee).

The Service and Social Justice Committee's resolution of support for the "People's Rights Resolution" passed by 52 to 3 votes. A letter of support will be drafted by the SSJC for signature by the congregation President.

The Treasurer reported to the board that the congregation is about \$12,000 ahead of the anticipated budget for the sevenmonth mark into the fiscal year. After the Finance Committee did all the work for the Mid-Year meeting draft budgets, they are being rewarded with...you guessed it! More hard work! Their project of reviewing some of the larger expenses associated with the remodel and setting up a depreciation schedule should be completed by February. The committee recently received an internal audit report and will complete a formal response to be presented to the Board in March.

The Policy Team has finalized the Memorial Policy and it is now officially noticed and accepted. Next up is a minor change to the cash handling policy to reflect the use of the drop box. The Board had some discussion about the possibility of a formal child-care policy for events other than congregational meetings. More discussion will be held in the future.

The Café Committee reported that four shows are scheduled before summer break and four are already scheduled for next season. The committee may reduce the number of shows next year. The Board noted that cutting the number of concerts might have an impact on the budget, although it was early to say.

The Facilities Management Committee was thrilled with the turnout at the Great Storage Room Cleanout on January 21. The sound frame construction continues. The Sunshine Pre-School has decided to disband and will no longer be meeting at River of Grass.

The Faith Development Committee began Our Whole Lives I (OWL) classes for the middle school students on February 12. In January, the Board approved an unbudgeted expenditure to allow rental of a classroom from the temple (which meets in the office park) in order to ensure privacy. Eleven students have signed up, some from outside the congregation. Affirmation will be offered next year to this age group.

The elementary school class continues to grow, with several new families attending regularly. The committee is requesting funding next year for a 10-hours-a-week Faith Development assistant position. The Board put discussion of this item on the agenda for March.

The Service and Social Justice Committee reported that its theme will be justice for immigrant families impacted by deportation and other hardships. To that end, Jeannette Smith of the local New Sanctuary movement met with the committee on Feb. 16. The

next Volunteer Day at LifeNet4Families is March 10. The Guest at Your Table (GAYT) collected \$920 for UUSC from our congregation.

The Worship Committee presented five services in the long month of January! The committee met on January 25 with eight members attending. The Vespers team has decided to take a hiatus for a while and revisit the programming. Per the Board's vote last month, a message has been inserted into the liturgy and Order of Service regarding applause (please don't until the end of the service). Upcoming events include a workshop on March 10 and lay leader training in April. Two service leader openings remain on the calendar in June – now is your chance to share what's on your mind!

The Board remembered that it is presenting an Auction event in June – the "River of Gas Chili Cook Off and Murder Mystery." In order to make this a quality event, planning needs to start! Buy your tickets now, folks, because this is going to be awesomely aromatic – one way or another.

In accordance with our Vision statement, the Board developed action items and the Congregation will be seeing the results soon. One of our goals is promoting the building of community and connection with one another. To that end, a Congregational picnic will be held on Saturday, March 31. More details will be forthcoming.

Several financial scenarios were presented by our board of trustees during the congregational meeting in February. Each reflected varying degrees of supplemental staff and professional ministry. BRINGING PEACE TO OUR LIVES, RELATIONSHIPS, AND COMMUNITIES By Kathy Jens-Rochow, Worship Chair

The Worship Committee and the Speaker Team are hosting an introductory workshop in Nonviolent Communication with Rev. LoraKim Joyner, Unitarian Universalist Community minister in Gainesville,, on Saturday, March 10th from 10:00am to 3:00pm. This special workshop is open to all River of Grass members, friends and the community.

Nonviolent Communication (NVC) is based on the principles of nonviolence and was developed by Marshall Rosenberg. Practicing NVC allows the natural state of compassion to rise up as we rid our thoughts, words and actions of violence.

NVC begins by assuming that we are all compassionate by nature and that violent strategies –

whether verbal or physical – are learned behaviors taught and supported by the prevailing culture. NVC also assumes that we all share the same basic human needs, and that each of our actions is a strategy to meet one or more of these needs.

People who practice NVC have found greater authenticity in their communication, increased understanding, deepening connection, and conflict resolution.

Rev. Joyner will also be in the pulpit on March 11. The title of her service is "Compassionate Communication: Loving the Jackal Within and Without." She will help us understand and accept human beings even when their communication makes them sound like jackals.
