It seems to me most of our New Year Resolutions tend to be more negative than positive in nature - even when we frame them positively. Think about one of the most popular and prevalent resolutions – "I Will Lose Weight". While that statement is framed positively – as an "I Will" – the underlying feeling may be nega-

tive: the notion of deprivation, of doing without food and flavors we desire, of negative body image or declining health.

For some of us the "I Will Lose Weight" resolution might as well be said as, "Don't Think of Cheesecake!" That's the Ironic Processing element of the Resolution Failure equation.

What is the Aristotelian vacuum element? Psychologically speaking, the fact that taking cheesecake (the unhealthy) component out of our lives without replacing it with a positive component leaves a vacuum Nature will rush to fill with something, anything, we might deem satisfying, especially in a moment of emotional vulnerability. I don't know about you, but more than once in my life, I turned to cheesecake for comfort. Except it didn't really work. At least not for more than a minute or two.

At the start of the New Year, while we are busy with all of those resolutions on what we will do to better our lives and our health, River of Grass will be widening its circle of giving, and providing us all with the opportunity to better the lives and health of others as well. The driving force behind this bold step into 2013 is ... our youth.

In an ongoing effort to involve our youth in service and social justice issues, the Board reached out to them and asked them to research and choose an organization for our congregation to support that they felt had an impact on their lives and their future. The deal on the table was that for one week a month, the ½ plate donation would go to their cause – but first they had to work for it, and sell it to the Board as a worthy cause.

Here were the requirements:

One organization must be chosen for the remainder of this congregational year.

- The organization must be humanitarian (helping *people* in our community).
- The organization must be *local* (so that the youth can also be a physical presence through volunteering).
- The organization must be *qualified* (vetted evaluated and credentialed).
- The Board of Trustees must *approve* the organization chosen.



And here was the process:

- First, youth leadership would look for current needs in our local community and recommend to the youth some local organizations that are addressing those needs.
- Second, youth leadership would discuss these organizations with the youth.
- Third, the youth would research the organizations: who they are, what they do, what are the volunteer opportunities, and how do they fit within the scope of our principles and purposes regarding the services they provide and to whom?
- Fourth, the youth would rate the organizations discussed and vote for their top two.
- ♦ And, lastly, a proposal to support their first choice with all of the information gathered above would be submitted to the Board for review and consideration.

As you will see from our Board Matters report, starting this month, the Board has approved that ½ the undesignated funds in the 4th Sunday offering be donated to ARC Broward. Be sure to read about ARC Broward and the Youth Group Proclamation in that article. Take the time to talk to the youth about why they chose this organization and how it touched their lives. You will be impressed!

I am proud that our youth have taken the initiative to look at what community outreach means to them. I look forward to seeing them grow as UUs as they step out to engage with intention as volunteers in their outreach of choice.

BOARD MATTERS

In last month's newsletter, I reported that we were asked by our youth to find another charitable organization (besides LifeNet4Famlies) to donate ½ the plate offering for the 4th Sunday service. The intention is to involve our youth more in congregational activities and encourage philanthropy in our youngest members.

After much discussion and fact finding, the board accepted our youth's nomination of ARC Broward, Achievement and Rehabilitation Incorporated. Serving South Florida for more than half a century, ARC Broward has been providing services to "children and adults with Autism, Down Syndrome, and other intellectual disabilities – and other challenges. ARC Broward also "operates a Community Mental Health Cen-

ter that offers outpatient services including individual, family and group therapy as well as psychiatric assessments and medication management for children and adults with severe and persistent mental illness." The board members were very pleased with this selection and voted to begin this month and continue through the congregational year.

River of Grass Youth Group Proclamation

"We The People of the Youth Group of River of Grass Unitarian Universalist Congregation do hereby request that the River of Grass Board of Trustees accept our proposal that ½ of the collected plate of the last Sunday of each month (4th Sunday) go to supporting the non-profit organization called ARC Broward."

LifeNet4Families, a community kitchen and emergency food pantry for the less fortunate in our community.)

Another exciting decision was completed at our last meeting. The board agreed for River of Grass to "sponsor" a candidate for Unitarian Universalist ministry. A long time member, Deb Rostorfer, has completed many of the requirements towards becoming a minister: attending seminary and working with an experienced minister, to name a couple. The UUA Ministerial Fellowship Committee requires a sponsor congregation for all aspiring ministers. As her sponsor, River of Grass will ensure familiarity on the part of the new minister with UU congregational life and take a responsible role in her preparation and assessments. 


December was full of light, remembrance, and celebration; we were reminded to cherish each other and our lives and to celebrate the light and the love of family and friends! We celebrated in so many ways...

bUUkies Announces Unitarian Universalist "Common Read"

The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness, by civil rights attorney, Michelle Alexander, has been selected as the 2012-13 Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) Common Read.



The author asserts that crime-fighting policies and systems in the U.S., such as the "war on drugs" and the incarceration system, disproportionately and intentionally affect Americans of color. She describes multifaceted, lifelong discrimination and disenfranchisement that affect people who are branded "felon."

A Common Read invites participants to read and discuss the same book in a given period of time. A Common Read can build community in our congregations and our movement by giving diverse people a shared experience, shared language, and a basis for deep, meaningful conversations.

Copies are available from the UUA bookstore, as well as from e-book sellers and the public library. Also, check out the UUA discussion guide, available on the UUA website, and the Facebook group called UUA Common Read Lab for information how to spread awareness and foment discussion of action steps for people of faith.

Read this important book and come join the bUUkies for a discussion tentatively set for mid-March. Keep posted for more details and a March meeting date.


MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE
