THE NUMBER OF OUR DAYS

or the shortest month on our calendar, February has an awful lot going on. Opening with entertaining observances, Bubble Gum Day (February 1) and the Super Bowl (February 3), and closing with the more whimsical National Tooth Fairy Day (February 28) and Inconvenience Yourself Day (February 27), there is something for just about anyone between. Southerners frolic their way through Mardi Gras on the 12th while Northerners await the Winter forecast from Punxsutawney Phil on Groundhog Day, February 2nd. (Here, at River of Grass, we enjoy the Annual Auction on February 2nd.)

Many Christians observe Lent, a 40-day period of prayer, penance and sacrifice beginning February 3rd this year, and Jews celebrate Purim, which marks Mordecai leading the victory over Israel's enemies as told in the book of Esther, this year on February 24th.

By the way, Mardi Gras is always the day before Ash Wednesday, providing those who may have over-celebrated

much opportunity to repent – and recover.

We know that Presidents Day honors our 1st and 16th presidents, Washington and Lincoln with a Federal holiday – the president that helped to birth our country, and the one who helped rebirth it following the bitter Civil War. But who knew about International Sword Swallowers Day on the 23rd. If you survive that, you can go to the Daytona 500 on the 24th.

The Chinese New Year begins on February 10^{th} . You can Take Your Child to the Library Day on the 2^{nd} to learn more about it.

For all of February's vastly varying opportunities for remembering and reveling, we are, of course, most familiar with the observance of the feast of Saint Valentinus who was imprisoned for, among other offenses, performing weddings for soldiers who were forbidden to marry. Legend has it that before he was executed he healed the daughter of his jailer Asterius by sending her a farewell note signed "from your Valentine."

The Valentine's Day we inherit this February 14th long ago forgot its heritage, lost in curly-cued stationery and heart-shaped confectionery. Like a lot of other kids, I remember too clearly those grade school afternoons eagerly sifting through my oh-so-carefully decorated repurposed tissue box, only to finish wounded for whose cards I did not find.

For many, Valentine's Day is still a source of such wounding, for a variety of reasons – from those who were coupled and now are not, or never have been, or want to be but, like those soldiers in Valentinus' time, are legally forbidden.

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But still, we tend to believe in the healing power of love. The love we may find with another person, with family blood or chosen, with faithful friends – with Beloved Community. Beloved Community we share at River of Grass. Beloved Community I write in capitals because I believe the community we make our of Unitarian Universalist faith is sacred. It is holy because it helps to make us whole. It is proof of love's power to heal.

SOUTH FLORIDA CLIMATE ACTION CONFERENCE Steve Jens-Rochow, President, SE Cluster

limate change is the most important issue facing us today, and the SE Cluster is partnering to present the South Florida Climate Action Conference. We are joining members of the scientific-technical, faith-based, government, and activist communities in Bro-



ward, Miami-Dade, Monroe and Palm Beach counties to exchange information and work together to implement the SE Florida Regional Climate Action Plan (RCAP). Probably because of sea level rise, regional leaders have gotten together and written our regional climate action plan. We are fortunate to have this plan, for most areas of the country have not done planning like this.

The SE Florida regional climate change compact addresses how we can mitigate the causes of climate change and adapt to its consequences. The conference will stimulate dialogue and encourage us to engage in direct action to support the regional climate action plan. The RCAP is our region's response to climate change and sea level rise; by advocating and implementing this plan we will move our region toward climate resilience and sustainability.

The climate action conference will be on Saturday, March 2, from 9am to 5pm at the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Boca Raton, 2601 St. Andrews Blvd, Boca Raton, FL 33434, www.uufbr.org. BLACK HISTORY MONTH

id you know Black History Month got its start in 1926 as a week set aside to honor African-American contributions to American history? Every U.S. president since 1976 has officially designated February as Black History Month. Other countries around the world, including Canada and the United Kingdom, have followed the United States' lead and devoted a month to celebrating black history.

Black history, like all history, isn't just about dates and facts; it's about people making a difference in each others' lives.

Take the story of John Price. Price ran away from a slaveholder in Kentucky when he was sixteen and found his way to Oberlin, Ohio, where he settled among the welcoming townspeople. Oberlin was a stop on the Underground Railroad, a vast network of people from the South to Canada, who opened their homes and risked their lives to help slaves escape to freedom. After the passage of the Fugitive Slave Law of 1850, bounty-hunters often roamed the streets of towns like Oberlin, looking for runaway slaves.

This book will be used to inspire, comfort, and support those engaged in caring for someone in need and those who wish to explore their own capacity for caring and compassion. One September morning in 1858, when Price was eighteen, he was captured by bounty hunters and held in a hotel in the nearby town of Wellington to wait for a southbound train. When the people of Oberlin heard of Price's capture, they rushed to Wellington, stormed the hotel, and freed the young man. Price was hidden at the home of an Oberlin College professor until his safe passage to Canada could be assured.

History doesn't remember the names of all the people who freed John Price. All we know is that some were farmers and some were businessmen, some were slaves and some were free, and some were black and some were white. But they were all Americans, ordinary people who cared enough to help.

This Black History Month, as we take the time to honor the contributions of African-Americans, let's remember the spirit of residents of Oberlin, people who looked past color and class distinctions and came together, with kindness and caring, to make the world a better place.
