### MINISTER'S CORNER

### LIFTING THE VEIL

Some 2,000 years ago, our ancient Celtic ancestors in the area we know as Ireland, the United Kingdom and northern France celebrated their new year on November 1. As it straddled the waning of the summer's heat and light with winter's coming cold darkness, the Celts accorded this passage particular power and considered the eve of this day hallowed – a tradition we inherit from Jewish custom, which counts the beginning of a day with the evening before it.

On this hallowed evening called "Samhain" (pronounced SAH-win),

Celts believed the boundary between the material world and spirit world became porous and permitted the spirits of those who died in the previous year to roam earth among the living. Thus was the veil lifted between both the past and future on this magical night, that the dead might be honored and feasted as the holders of the root-wisdom of the community.

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Of course, this voiding of barriers also opened the possibility of ill-intentioned spirits. For this possibility, households left food on their stoops to prevent hungry other-worlders from entering, and revelers wore masks when they left home after dark so that the ghosts would mistake them for fellow spirits and pass them by. Jack-o-lanterns were once made of carved turnips with a lighted candle inside intended either to frighten away mischievous spirits – or turn children into them as they spooked wayfarers on darkened pathways.

And the American tradition of trick-or-treating? Most likely dates back to early All Souls' Day parades in England, during which festivities poor citizens would be given "soul cakes" in exchange for promised prayers for a family's dead relatives. Many cultures celebrate All Hallows Eve, by tradition or adoption, each in its own way, including Christians who mark November 1 as All Saints Day, as inherited from the Roman church's adaptation of the same timeless Pagan festivities.

Each has its tales to tell about why we do what we do – though such tales do not explain our heritage so much as reveal what matters to us here and now.

Because Unitarian Universalist tradition honors each person's search for truth and meaning, we have among us those for whom October 31 remains a night of simple revelry while for others All Hallows Eve is indeed a holy day. Many UU congregations incorporate a time for remembering ancestors on the first Sunday of November, as is the tradition here at River of Grass.



But let us remember, we need no holiday to lift the veil between what has been, what is and what can be. We need no new dawn to pull back the masks we may have worn to protect – or project – ourselves. For that moment we dare to welcome Truth, is ever and always … hallowed.

### **SMALL GROUP MINISTRIES**

- (Q.) What are Small Group Ministries?
- (A.) Small Group Ministries fall into two categories Affinity Groups and Covenant Groups

Affinity Groups attract people of common interests. (*The Men's Group, Women's Group, Full Moon Daughters' Group* and *bUUkies Reading Group* are examples of some of these.)

Covenant Groups are gatherings where members can more deeply explore spiritual topics that typically would not be part of a hospitality hour conversation. Small groups encourage sharing, and give people a chance to know each other more deeply. The fact that the topics being discussed are very personal seems to accelerate this process.

Most groups meet once month, at a day and time convenient for the group members. They are led by a member who has attended facilitator training, and follows a session outline (outlines are available online through the UUA Small Group Ministry Network). Many sessions revolve around classic spiritual themes while others have a more contemporary feel (*How do we strike a balance in our lives?*).

When the group forms, each member pledges, or covenants, to grow together, and keep all discussions confidential. Through that, and the highly personal nature of the conversations, we come to know each other very deeply. (Covenant groups are not a support group; people who need guidance with personal issues are encouraged to seek professional help.)

### New Covenant Groups Starting Soon



If you ask anyone who has been a member of a covenant group at River of Grass, they will agree that covenant groups exist for two simple yet profound purposes – to help you grow in community, friendship and belonging with other members, and to help you grow in your spiritual beliefs through focused and centered conversations about things that matter.

In October, the Committee on Shared Ministry will be sharing information about opportunities to join a Covenant Group; please follow the postings in the weekly email to learn more.
