

Jupiter's icy moon spouts water into space! Imagine a cold moon where water lumbers beneath a thick ice covering the surface, when suddenly awesome forces move the water up, up through the crust where it vaporizes and ascends to the height of a great mountain. And we are awestruck witness. What is happening on Europa? Is there possibility of other life there? More importantly, what does this event have to do with Board Matters? Read on.



Financially speaking, it's time for members to examine their progress of pledge payments, as we haven't reached the expected year to date level and are experiencing a shortfall. Notwithstanding the shortfall, I'm very grateful for the generosity of everyone in our congregation – and with the holidays behind us, we hope for a return to normal contribution levels.

The board approved a request by a member for a special fund raising concert at River of Grass for Abilities Venti, a non-profit organization "created by and for people with developmental disabilities." They are advocates and educators, who travel to Tallahassee to promote their issues to our state representatives. (They are the creators of the t-shirts with the slogan "Label Jars Not People.") See their <u>website</u> for details on the concert as soon as they are available.

The board approved a request by facilities to purchase a bigger dishwasher. If you would like to make a designated contribution for this much needed improvement, please drop your check in the collection basket and indicate: dishwasher.

The board also approved a Service and Social Justice Committee request for a petition signing to amend the Unitarian Universalist Association's by-laws to include gender identity. See our SSJC article for more details.

Board members again reported on progress toward our goals and objectives for the year. Slow incremental progress was noted on most goals. We also began painstakingly reviewing our congregational policies and came up with suggestions. We will be working with the policy committee to bring these suggested changes to you in the coming weeks.



We discussed our upcoming mid-year congregational meeting agenda and planned the Board's contribution to our annual auction. We are cooking up some fun so look for our event sign up at the auction! (BTW, the Congregational Mid-Year Meeting is on Sunday, February 2nd, 2014, after service.)

So how are River of Grass activities like water on Europa? I envision our numerous activities to be like the this water, moving under the surface, making slow progress and channeling our way, struggling on unnoticed by the casual observer. Occasionally, our efforts emerge in a brilliant display with time, persistence and courage, like Europa's water. For instance, our recent holiday pageant and Christmas Eve service, the touching stories of caring compiled by our Caring Committee, the outpouring of holiday gifts for the foster children and the unfailing support to the less fortunate in our community through LifeNet4Families. UUA By-Laws

Our Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) has always taken the lead regarding the defense of those who are subject to discrimination. Although ahead of its time when first adopted, the current UUA Bylaws do not include "gender identity or expression" in its Non-discrimination clause. As written, the Nondiscrimination clause promotes "the full participation of people in the UUA without regard to race, ethnicity, gender, disability, affectional or sexual orientation, age, language, citizenship status, economic status or national origin."

Because of the absence of "gender identity or expression," transgendered people are not currently covered by the UUA Nondiscrimination clause as written. To remedy this, we will be proposing that an amendment to the Non-discrimination clause be presented at the 2014 General Assembly.

During January, the Service and Social Justice Committee will be gathering member signatures on a petition to amend the UUA Bylaws at General Assembly to include gender identity or expression in the Non-discrimination Clause.



Richard first met his hero, the Godfather of finger style guitar, Chet Atkins when he was only eleven and was invited by Chet to play with him on stage at Her Majesty's Theatre in London in front of an audience of about a thousand. He played Chet's arrangement of Whispering, and Chet played along with him. Then the audience went mad and Chet asked him to play another one. By the time he reached his early twenties, both Chet Atkins and Jerry Reed began to refer to Richard Smith as their Hero and still do.

There seems to be no limit to Richard's ability to quickly master whatever guitar style captures his fancy. The complex styles of many guitar greats including Django Reinhardt, Les Paul, and Lenny Breau have proved to be no impediment to his voracious musical appetite. Apart from his guitar virtuosity, he is also an accomplished banjo and violin player.



Richard has toured around the world, surprising audiences everywhere with his genius, showcasing a repertoire spanning an incredible range of musical styles from country, bluegrass, mainstream jazz, modern pop and rock, to classical guitar.
