SEARCH BY TITLE

ep ... my people," I commented to myself as I surveyed titles on the book exchange table at the EUU (European Unitarian Universalist) Spring Retreat just outside Paris in April. Titles from philosophy, history, mystery, poetry, social science, biography, Dr. Kinsey and Dr. Seuss, the heady and the not-so-much – a sincere reflection of the gathering itself: UUs from England, France, Switzerland, Holland, Germany, Belgium, expats from the USA and more. Though it's certainly not the whole story, to some degree you've met people when you've met their books. Browsing these folks' volumes made me feel right at home half a world away from my own.



What interested me more was how the people who belonged to these books also found

themselves here, in the Forêt de Fontainebleau (Forest of Fontainebleau, hunting grounds for French royalty since the 16th century and Napoleon's residence in the early 1800's), joining together to deepen, enliven and celebrate their Unitarian Universalist faith -- and what brought them to this faith in the first place. Listening to their stories, I marveled again at what a remarkable interconnected web of being we are in community, anywhere and anytime we gather (never mind how 2nd and 3rd degree connections blazed with other participants – the godparents of a teen I coached at SUUSI, others who've attended SUUSI, former members of Florida congregations I've served over the years!). How powerful the search for truth and meaning that leads us to one another. How utterly unique we are, yet how alike. We may read the same books, but often for very different reasons.

Love radically. Serve gratefully. Wonder daily. Unitarian Universalism Whatever the ways we find ourselves together, it is what happens next that matters more. It is not enough that we have found one another. Not sufficient only to have found this faith. It is how we grow together henceforth that can and will make the difference in ourselves and our world. To find one another is a gift of our quest. How then shall we fulfill that gift? What dedication, what commitment, what portion

of our selves and our resources will we offer to build this Beloved Community, that it might be here for others as it has been for us? That we might honor our heritage and feed our future. That we might render our own pages in the book of Unitarian Universalist history for our era.

Some time ago, noting a shelf in my house that held numerous sacred and historical texts from many religious traditions along with writings of Emerson, Thoreau and Whitman, I joked it should probably catch fire! Years later I found Unitarian Universalism. And that shelf did catch fire. In my heart. For this faith. That we might proclaim it. That we might ever cherish search more than surety. That we might gather not only for ourselves but for Truth with all who seek it – by any title.



Then Worship Committee Chair is just the position for you, especially if our time together on Sundays is important to you. The Worship Committee is charged with ensuring inspiring and spiritual Sunday services. This includes finding Sunday service leaders for the Sundays when Rev. Amy is not in the pulpit, recruiting volunteers for sound, PowerPoint, Sunday hosts and ushers who set-up and are responsible for counting the offering. BOARD MATTERS Zena Tucker, Board Secretary

There are many things to report to you, dear readers, so I'll dive right in!

Our Treasurer, Gary Gonzalez, noted that we have overcome the majority of our planned deficit budget. To be completely in the black by the end of the congregational year, members who are behind in their pledges should make sure to catch up on their pledges soon.

The board approved three requests from the Service and Social Justice Committee. They are as follows:

(1) SSJC requested a Move to Amend resolution be added to the congregational ballot. The board approved, stipulating that the SSJC provide a discussion forum on the topic for the entire congregation prior to the annual meeting. See the SSJC report for more information about this important issue and the planned forum.

(2) The board approved a "Make a Lunch" event at River of Grass to benefit Habitat for Humanity. This is scheduled for Saturday, June 28th. Again, look for details in the SSJC report.

(3) The SSJC requested River of Grass become a congregational supporter of UU Justice Florida (UUJF) by earmarking \$1 per person in the budget similar congregation's current practice of donating \$1 per person for UU Service Committee. The mission of UUJF is to build a Florida-wide network of Unitarian Universalists, interfaith and secular partners to work together for a more just and compassionate society. The board also approved a Small Group Ministry request to designate the "Game Night" group as an official affinity group in our congregation. Congratulations and thanks to Ingrid Furlong for initiating the group!

July (Date: TBD) - Stormy Weather by Carl Hiaasen




Hiaasen's writing is modern and clever and his imagination knows no limits. His books

MOVE TO AMEND CONGREGATIONAL RESOLUTION

Since the Citizens United decision, the only way to overcome corporations and their huge amount of money is with a grass roots movement. Margaret Mead said, "never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world; indeed it's the only thing that ever has." An important part of that movement is for organizations and municipal, county and state governments to pass resolutions that support <u>Move to Amend</u>.

The Service and Social Justice Committee will offer a resolution to support Move to Amend for River of Grass to vote on at its Annual Meeting on Sunday,

June 1. We need a Constitutional amendment to establish that corporations are not persons and money is not speech. After the recent Supreme Court ruling in the *McCutcheon* case, such an amendment to the Constitution is even more needed.

Six UU congregations in Florida have already passed resolutions. Because Unitarian Universalists believe in the "inherent worth and dignity of every person," and in the "use of the democratic process" in society at large it is important to return power to the people where it belongs.
