LEADING TO FOLLOW

alk ahead and let me put my steps in your steps," she said as we grouped to go up the mountain. "You seem so sure footed and I so surely am not."

It's from my ancestors, this sense I discovered as a child, this way my feet can grasp the Earth, can know footholds on unfamiliar ground, unafraid. One moonless night I was 11 or 12, my mother and I were stranded by a broken car deep on a dark wooded country road. "Don't worry, Mom," I said as we headed out through pitch black, "I can see with my feet." She wasn't sure what to make of me (often the case), but she let me lead and we made it out to a neighboring farmhouse without trouble.

But on this day on this mountain, I dearly yearned to *follow*. I wanted to make my way a small distance behind our group, in silence. I wanted to be at least a little alone with the wind and sun and sky. With just the sound of leaves and birds and this morning's rainwater trickling along the way. With the low hum of wise old trees, and the whip of sinewy saplings extending strong arms along the rocks. My blood sings in the woods. A song I know in the farthest corners of my soul. A song I hadn't heard in far too long, and ached to hear – if only, on this trek, I could follow.

"Let me put my steps in your steps," she said. My new friend with a new knee and a new hiking pole and a newfound courage anxious to put all three to use on a mountain trail this beautiful autumn afternoon. And so, we set off, with her right behind me step for step, others taking the rear behind her, all of us proceeding as quietly as possible.



I'm not exactly sure on what part of the trail it occurred to me I wasn't leading. At that particularly steep rock outcropping by the reddening maple tree? That bend where the cottonwoods leaned in to help? The overlook where we all stood breathless, partly because of the view, partly because of the climb? I'm not sure which moment, as I chose my steps with my friend's in mind.

But the thought rose as powerful as my blood rising to muscles that had forgotten all about mountains: "I *am* following."

Following the fundamental calling of human kinship. Following the vow to answer that calling. Following the need of another on this path. I might have walked before her, but also *for* her.

Any who are drawn to lead do well to be deeply determined, devoted followers. Followers of tears and smiles and stories to their sources. Followers of the mystery that ebbs and flows with our very breath. Followers of questions we hope against hope will turn up answers – even when our hearts know better. Followers of the cries of people, of communities, of a world hungry for just a bit more kindness.

"Let me put my steps in your steps," she said.

And I followed her lead.



Your Board of Trustees met for our Annual Board Retreat with Rev. Amy on October 4, where we reviewed our mission statement, covenant, and by-laws. Additionally, we came up with ideas for improvements and conducted a short business session that allowed us to forgo our normal meeting later that week. More importantly, we got to know each other, shared home-cooked dishes and were inspired by moving activities, music, and lessons by Rev Amy. Who says Board work is all work and no play?

During our business session, we approved the Full Moon Daughter request for a fundraiser to benefit the Otter Exhibit at Flamingo Gardens. Additionally, the board approved the Abilities Venti concert, sponsored by the SSJC, on January 25. And, finally, speaking of fun, the board decided on its own fundraising event for our Annual Auction. (The board event is scheduled for May 16. More details to follow in future newsletters.)

The board is beginning work toward creating continuity files for each committee. Child care will be available and we will try to keep the meeting to no more than 2 hours. Absentee voting is not allowed. So please plan to attend this critical meeting that will impact the future of our congregation.

The Girl Choir of South Florida sang for the Sept. 21st Water Communion, Welcome-back worship service. The 16 girls, ages 13-18 (a small subset of the 150-girl organization) sang 3 "water" songs, all by Moira Smiley, who was one of the girls' main

workshop clinicians this summer. The emotionally-moving postlude was "Famine Song," about Sudanese women who wove baskets to provide for their children amidst intense famine in the 1980s.

The Girl Choir of South Florida sang as a favor to River of Grass. They are a nonprofit arts organization under the artistic direction of Wallis Peterson. Their mission is to enrich girls' lives through musical excellence. The choir is a diverse group of young women with different backgrounds and beliefs who sing together and support each other.

The Girl Choir brought back some symbolic water for the worship service from the snow-covered Mount Hood they visited while on tour in Oregon in July. The choir enjoyed the wonderful service presented by Rev. Amy Carol Webb, and the congregation loved hearing the girls sing! It was a beautiful worship experience!
