WHAT WILL YOU DO?

ell me, what is it you plan to do," Mary Oliver asks in her poem *The Summer Day*, "Tell me what is it you plan to do with your one wild and precious life?"*

I love that question. I hate that question. It's one of those that once raised cannot be recinded. It seems altogether too big to even consider. Funny that, as it closes Oliver's careful chronicle of the smallest movements of a grasshopper snacking on sugar from the poet's own hand – and the possibility that the act of paying attention is itself a form of prayer.

Sometimes big questions are better asked in small portions. So for the moment let's ask only this: What is it you plan to do with your one wide and precious Summer?





I love Summer. And I don't. Summer begins with endings and ends with beginnings. Begins with graduations, ends with matriculations. Begins with teens and young adults launching into life, ends with kinders' first day of school. Begins with the end of a congregational year, ends with the beginning of new one, with time between for lay leadership to offer inventive services, members to travel, ministers to rest and study – and

for all to reflect on what what lies behind and before, released from at least some of the routines that drive other seasons.

You can find me on the rocky shores of Rhode Island (UU General Assembly), in the hills of Virginia (SUUSI!), among the old oaks of Savanah, walking the steaming sands of Miami's Atlantic shores and watching the Summer rains from my own heavenly front porch, all the while charting new paths forward in faith, rejoicing we shall continue together to row this living, loving River upward, onward through this one wild and precious life!
