SINGING FOR OUR LIVES Rev. Amy Carol Webb

Right was the tyrant king who once said, 'Beware of a movement that sings.'
For whenever and wherever the oppressed challenge the old order, songs are on their lips.

~ from the IWW (Industrial Workers of the World) Little Red Songbook (1923)

Since the beginning of known history, prophets, heretics, rebels and visionaries of every stripe have taken to the streets to sing truth to power. When fourth century anti-trinitarian theologian Arius stood up at the council of Nicea in 325 c.e. (in what is now Turkey) to oppose the Church's declaration of Jesus as God, he was pronounced a heretic, barred from the Council and

ordered never to speak of his theology. Forbidden to preach, Arius then went into the streets and down to the docks and sang his sermons, which spread the fire of his faith faster than any spoken word could have – a little known chapter of Arius' life and what would centuries later develop as "Unitarianism," a belief in the oneness of God alone.

Come forward sixteen centuries to walk the road to Selma with Martin Luther King, Jr., Unitarian folk singer Pete Seeger in step, leading the marchers in the song we now know bone deep, "We Shall Overcome," proving the truth Dr. King declared that, "... songs bind us together, give us courage together, help us march together."

A decade later, the Reverend Eugene B. Navias gathered a selection of hymns written by Unitarians and Universalists in North America over the preceding two centuries in *Singing Our History*, in part to "trace the history of our evolving faith, and reflect the urgency of our social concerns."

Open the Unitarian Universalist hymnals now in use – *Singing the Living Tradition* and its supplement, *Singing the Journey* – and you will find topic headings for "Justice and Equity" and "Justice and Social Action" with songs like Holly Near's "We Are A Gentle Angry People," and Ysaye M. Barnwell's "We Are..."

Sunday, March 7, 1965, King and Seeger, clergy and allies of all denominations including Unitarian Universalists, marched across the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, Alabama seeking justice. In the wake of that prophetic walk, two Unitarian Universalists paid with their lives -- the Rev. James Reeb beaten to death in an alleyway on a way to a voting rights organizing meeting, and ally Viola Gregg Liuzzo, ambushed as she drove black marchers back to their homes. They called it Bloody Sunday.

Fifty years later, on March 8, 2015, I will join with Unitarian Universalists and others who stand, march, walk and roll for justice to mark Selma's jubilee by once more crossing the Pettus bridge to honor those who made that first march, to remember those who gave their lives for justice then, before and since – and to renew, revive and recharge our commitment to the cause of justice clearly not yet fulfilled in our own time.

On that Selma Sunday, if you tilt your ear Northward, you may just hear us singing, "We shall overcome." We're still singing for our lives.







Portland Oregon






Speaking of assemblies, the totally awesome and spectacular Unitarian Universalist Association General Assembly (GA) is in a few short months. Thousands of Unitarian Universalists will gather June 24–28, 2015, in Portland, Oregon to focus on climate justice and conduct the business of the UUA. The provocative and influential Cornel West will deliver the 2015 Ware Lecture, GA's keynote address. Registration for GA 2015 begins on Monday, March 2 at 12:00 noon EST. Hotel registration also will open at that time. Everyone who plans to attend GA must register, and while there is on-site registration, registration fees increase after April 30. Volunteers who donate at least 24 hours of service (14 hours for youth) do not pay a registration fee. About 200 to 300 volunteers are needed. Opportunities to sign up as a volunteer also begin on March 2. Please visit http://www.uua.org/ga/registration/index.shtml for more information.

GRANT PEEPLES

Saturday, March 21st, 2015 - 8:00 pm

Rolk/Roots artist Grant Peeples is known for his axe-sharp sociopolitical tunes as well as Roger Miller type humor and heart gigging ballads. Songwriting legend Bobby Braddock described him "like Prine, but with a Southern bent." Music News Nashville called him "a guitar-slinging poet."



Peeples' tours have included performances at The Woody Guthrie Folk Festival in Okemah, OK, The Living Room in New York City, and The Triple Door in Seattle. His records, produced by Gurf Morlix (Lucinda Williams, Ray Wylie Hubbard, Robert Earl Keen) have topped Folk/Roots charts in the US and in Europe.

Peeples has been dubbed a "guitar-slinging poet" by Music News Nashville.

This finger-in-your-eye styled songwriter and 7th generation Floridian is a former expatriate. He spent 11 years on a tiny island off the coast of Nicaragua, where he installed the island's first flushing toilet. He returned in 2006 to a very different homeland. Much of his songwriting is a response to what he found when he returned.

Grant's latest release, Punishing the Myth, debuted at #1 on the Freeform American Roots chart.

It is the third of a trilogy of records produced by legendary roots icon Gurf Morlix. John Conquest of 3rd Coast Music has named him songwriter of the year multiple times. Of his writing, Conquest says, "Unusually literate, unusually honest... Grant Peeples is the only songwriter I've ever called ruthless."
