OVER SPILT MILK Rev. Amy Carol Webb

I twas over spilled coffee actually. In dawn twilight, I knocked over my old ceramic Melitta coffee dripper and covered half my kitchen with a royal mess of hot, wet coffee grounds. My Melitta didn't break, tough old thing that it is, but for a moment I thought I might. "I. DO. NOT. HAVE. TIME. FOR. THIS!" my brain screeched (though I did not, given I was the only one awake, nor did I want to frighten the dog).



But, generally speaking, messes don't clean themselves up. And while there are some that can be left for later, like the newspapers in the corner waiting for the recycling bin, soupy coffee grounds splattered over what seemed, at the time, a full square mile isn't something one can walk away from till one feels like dealing with it. So I set about mopping it all up, which is to be expected. While paying attention to the urge to cry over it, which is not.

It's called "displacement" – the inner self's way of letting us know, through a too-strong reaction to something that isn't really all that important, that we may not have sufficiently dealt with something that is important. Our selves and our society

are rife with it. More often than not, it shows up as anger, because anger feels powerful while tears do not – though underneath that anger there is usually some other feeling of grief, pain, fear, or vulnerability.

Which brings us to this month of hearts and flowers. This month of love – and, for many, loss. Actually, for just about everybody, loss. Because, for all the love that is in our lives, there is also love that isn't – at least if we've been on the planet any length of time. Most of us tend to tuck our losses away, intentionally or not, in the interest of tending to the day-to-day, doing what must be done, because the world does just keep on turning and us with it, and we're taught the only socially acceptable answer to the question "How are you?" is "I'm fine, thanks," and one day becomes the next and then the next. Until you knock over your coffee dripper one morning.

It would appear the old saying isn't all that true: "It's no use crying over spilt milk." Yes, there are times we simply clean up the mess and move on. There are also times we can give ourselves permission to stop, feel our feelings, consider their origins, and ask for help if we need it.

Sometimes crying over spilt milk is not only useful, but helpful. And sometimes in the month of hearts and flowers the one we need most to love is ourselves.

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
FROM THE BOARD PRESIDENT Zena Tucker

I tall started with one of those forwarded emails that one usually ignores. Marjie Loring forwarded it, however; she's our past President. I read it. It ended up with dozens of people working hundreds of hours and a refurbished dining room for the local community kitchen for the homeless.

Marjie knows how much we cherish Martin Luther King and learned of grants administered by Broward College for MLK Service Projects. "Go forth and do good," was the call in honor of Dr. King. This was a perfect fit for River of Grass

Unitarian Universalist Congregation and our newly installed minister, Reverend Amy Carol Webb. She spoke boldly at a recent service about "Black Lives Matter" and about how important it is to ask, "How can we help?" versus assuming we know best. She spoke also about how it's important to show up for others' causes and needs.

Rev Amy practiced what she preached and showed up to the organizing meeting for the MLK Service Grant. "What shall we do?" was bounced far and wide through the email verse, committee and board meetings. Turns out the proposal that



arrived to us first came from LifeNet4Families, a community kitchen and support center supporting Broward County's most in need. And what a natural fit again, as River of Grass volunteers at the food pantry and donates regularly there.

The project: Refurbish the dining room. Who: River of Grass and anyone else willing to join us. The cost: \$3500. Simple, right? Oh my, no.

Bountiful paperwork, organizing times for the work without disrupting daily food service, meetings, getting volunteers, designing the refurbish work, tracking hours spent, purchasing supplies, returning mistakes or unused items, and hours and hours of dirty, hard work taxed our bodies and brains. Thankfully, our lead organizer, Ken Bresnahan, stayed steady throughout. One has to wonder how he hauled all that stuff in his Scion.

Then, when the congregation volunteers grew weary, in stepped three pals from US Southern Command where I work. John Uharriet, Max Desosa and Ray Fleury jumped at the opportunity to help. Among the long list of help they provided, they replaced all the baseboards, in one day!

Two improvements worthy of special note are the custom-made storage units and installation of a television set with wiring to the office. Congregation member GL Franklin and assisted by congregational friend Steve Alloco created sturdy cabinetry to store clients' belongings while they dine, saving dining table space for food and people. Meanwhile, Dave Henkel wired and installed a television, enabling office staff to provide entertainment, music and training to the diners. In addition, Dave rewired two existing, required bug zappers, bringing everything up to code.

Scrubbed and painted from ceiling to floor, from backdoor to front and all in between, the room was transformed. Each day, Ken led a chalice lighting, set long tables up with all the gear and put on smooth music to work by. Each day, people who perhaps might not get along were they talking politics or sports, worked in harmony and with satisfaction. And each evening, well past the expected stop work time, the team would pack it all in the little Scion and go home, tired but proud.

At the ribbon cutting, Rev Amy's dedication captured the spirit: "May we continue the work of justice and the way of love in the memory of the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King. He taught us that we would remember the silence of our friends more than the words of our enemies and that our actions speak louder than words. May the good work continue."

Here's to LifeNet4Families. Here's to all those who show up for the good work of River of Grass Unitarian Universalist Congregation. (Photos to be published in next month's newsletter.) And here's to the perfect fit of message and deed.

COVENANT GROUPS AT RIVER OF GRASS Submitted by Janet Schwartz and Ingrid Furlong

Starting in February, River of Grass will launch five new Covenant Groups. We hope these groups will shorten the time it takes for our newest members to feel they

are "one of us," and help all of us form deeper bonds with another. Our goal is to develop a sustainable program that serves both the faith development as well as the social fabric our congregation. One essential aspect of a covenant group is the practice of "deep-listening," i.e. putting your full attention toward hearing and understanding what each person is trying to

communicate. This practice is a key part of the covenant group experience and one that not only enables a more meaningful discussion but also leads participants toward love and acceptance for one another.

Covenant groups will meet monthly at a variety of locations. Groups will meet in the north and east side of the county at a member's home, and others will meet in the daytime or evening at our River of Grass facility. The meetings will span approximately 1¹/₂ to 2 hours and observe the following format:

- Opening words and candle lighting
- "Check-in," in which each member of the group shares 2-3 minutes of what is happening in his or her life
- Reading of quotes and texts on a topic that is chosen and shared with the group in advance of the meeting
- Member thoughts each member of the group takes 5-7 minutes to share thoughts and experiences related to the topic and pose questions for discussion
- A facilitated discussion of the members' thoughts and experiences
- Closing words and extinguishing the candle

Each group will be led by a trained facilitator, who will enlist a group member process observer, so that the process remains true to the vision. If you are interested in becoming a member of a covenant group, please contact Janet Schwartz at <u>smallgroups@riverofgrassuu.org</u>.

RIVER OF GRASS CAFÉ DOUG MACLEOD Saturday, February 20th, 8:00 p.m.


