atching Olympic rowing this summer, we couldn't always hear the coxswains' calls – but we could see them. Men, women, pulling in rhythm, gliding smoother, faster, steadfast and unwavering over the water just under the hull. It's a visual symphony of strength, determination, collaboration, and cooperation. It's each taking their part and giving it the best they've got. Doesn't matter which oar they grasp, or which position in the boat. Without any one of them, it won't go. Without all of them, it can't reach their goal. As we launch our beautiful boat into the waters of this new congregational year, we can hear the coxswain's calls – "Justice! Peace! Compassion! Kindness! PULL!" – and vow that the world will see them in us. To be sure, the waters we row this season may be choppy, the world a storm beneath our hull, that it sometimes seems hard enough just to stay afloat. Still, pulling together in rhythm we dare to keep rowing smoother, faster, steadfast, and unwavering, resolved to live together the dream of a world transformed.

Our August 11 River of Grass UU Board of Trustees meeting was a busy one, as we welcomed Kristine Barkley as a new Board Trustee on the 2016-2017 Board, Scott May took over as Vice President, and Brit Lundell officially took over Treasurer duties. We're off to a great start!

We took official action to set the date of the next River of Grass UU Annual Congregational meeting on the first Sunday of May (May 7th, 2017), and voted to establish the first Sunday of May each year as the designated annual meeting date going forward. Please mark your calendars!

We approved a plan, with an expenditure of up to \$250, for the Faith Development Team to create another youth classroom, without making permanent changes to walls, or windows, etc. They'll take a look at some flexible options to split the multi-purpose room into 2 classrooms. The evening will begin with the viewing of *Making a Killing: Guns, Greed, and the NRA*, a film produced by Brave New Films, a socially conscious documentary film production company. Here is a synopsis of the film, from the production company's website:

### Making a Killing: Guns, Greed, and The NRA tells the



stories of how guns, and the *billions* made off of them, affect the lives of everyday Americans. It features personal stories from people across the country who have been affected by gun violence, including survivors and victims' families. The film exposes how the powerful

gun companies and the NRA are resisting responsible legislation for the sake of profit - and thereby putting people in danger.

The film looks into gun tragedies that include unintentional shootings, domestic violence, suicides, mass shootings and trafficking - and what we can do to put an end to this profit-driven crisis. Through this film and campaign, **Brave New Films** will work with partners to fight for a country where public safety is more valued than profit.

### **BEV KAUFMAN'S BOOK PUBLISHED!** By Wendell Abern

Rural New York, 1787. Our great Revolutionary War has ended, and people have settled into the day-to-day task of everyday living.

And in Bev Kaufman's gripping post-Revolutionary War mystery, *In the Midst of Death* ... we get a close-up view of the loves, hatreds, hopes and dreams of early Americans surviving together in a corner of the world rarely explored by mystery writers.

I take great personal pride in announcing the publication of this novel to River of Grass members, because Bev and I belong to the same writers' group. Our gang listened to this tale unfold over a period of years. After Bev would read a chapter, each of us would offer a critique. The most oft-heard comment was, "Bev, you make the rest of us feel like amateurs."

And rightfully so. Bev handles words the way great outfielders track down fly balls: she makes it look easy.

The mystery (and I won't give anything away here) develops briskly through a fascinating cast of characters, headed by Ralph Folsom, a Shakespearean scholar and actor, who is eking out a hardscrabble existence as a farmer and trapper. Humor pops up unexpectedly, usually through conversations.

And while many writers struggle with dialog, it is clearly a Kaufmanesque forte. In fact, Bev's ability to capture Eighteenth Centuryspeak, with all of its quirks and idioms, had some in our writers' group believing that Bev is actually 246 years old, and grew up listening to it.

Take, for example, this amusing anecdote related by a cousin, Aaron Collins. He is describing how his mother had bought three whole bolts of red and gold brocade before the war, which she later fashioned into wedding quilts for new brides ... including Betty Barlow:

"Betty was, still is, a pros'tute keeps rooms next ta the Brown Bull. One day, she announced that she was gonna marry one of 'er customers. Mama was sick because she'd sworn that every bride in town would be blessed by her brocade. But Lord love 'er, she rallied; sent over one scrap of cloth 'bout the size o' my foot.

"The next morning, Betty did her 'counts 'n discovered that the whole of her intended's fortune would be less 'n one year's income from all 'er customers. She called off the weddin', the couple returned to their previous pecunyary 'rangement, an' as for the brocade, she cut it into ribbons and fashioned the most beautiful intricate bow, which she 'tached to the bell rope by which 'er gentlemen callers 'nounced their arrival. Mama took to 'er bed for a month."

Any historical novel, by definition, requires voluminous research. *In the Midst of Death* ... is a prime example. Footnotes abound. Obscure bits of information crop up in each chapter. By the time you finish the book, you will know what post-Revolutionary War New Yorkers studied in school; what kind of clothes they wore; what they ate for dinner, and how they fell in love.

And yes, romances play a big role in Bev's novel. Along with buried loot, long-simmering feuds, unexpected plot twists, and all the other ingredients that contribute to a thriller's thrillerdom.

At 600-plus pages, with a cover beautifully designed by our own Rick Tucker, *In the Midst of Death* ... sells for \$24. It is precisely what anyone wants from a book: a great read.


### Scatter Seeds
