## DRAW THE CIRCLE WIDE Rev. Amy Carol Webb

CANCTUARY: sanc·tu·ar·y -- noun

1. a place of refuge or safety. "people sought a sanctuary in time of trouble" *synonyms: refuge, haven, harbor, oasis, shelter* 

a nature reserve. "a bird sanctuary"
a holy place; a temple or church.

We begin October's theme, "To Be A People of Sanctuary", with the world around us more and more divided along tribal

lines, while we and those we love yearn more and more deeply for connection, for safety, for a place we can belong, a space where we can rest and breathe and restore ourselves, body and spirit.

The great teacher Mahatma Gandhi said, "Be the change you want to see in the world." An old proverb instructs, "If you're looking for a kind person, be that person." In a time desperate for Sanctuary, what if we at River of Grass became a people of the Sanctuary we seek? What kind of refuge might we offer? What haven? What harbor in these stormy times? What shelter for those feeling most as risk? What if we became the holiest of holies, the inner sanctum, thrown open to all who would come inside?

But aren't we already doing that, some might ask? Yes ... and no. In these contrary times, even our best and most intentional efforts toward radical hospitality may fail, when our more unconscious biases slip to the surface.

So what do we do to counter that, to disarm our more primal connections born of "alikeness?" Try this: seek out someone whose views, or actions, or words provoke

misgivings if not visceral disagreement in you. You know, that guy at work, that friend on-line, that old classmate that found you on Facebook, that family member that just always wrecks Thanksgiving, doggone it! Then invite them in. Into conversation, out for coffee, a private chat, a phone call, a sit on the porch. Resolve with yourself that you will under no circumstance argue with them. And each time you feel the urge to counter or correct hold still and listen instead. Chances are real good they might throw out some comment or other to "stir the pot." Don't stir. Listen. Listen long enough and you'll likely stumble upon the source of their contention. And I guarantee you that source is some pain, some deep disappointment, some heartbreak, some dream dashed against the often cruel realities of life. Theirs. Maybe yours, too. And right there -- right there in that moment, in that spot, is the chance to open a door of Sanctuary. To become, yourself, Sanctuary to one you once left outside on their own. To create together a refuge, a haven, a harbor, a shelter.

It can happen. When we draw the circle wide, and wider still.

## FAITH DEVELOPMENT Karen Gonzalez



Cober 24<sup>th</sup> is United Nations Day - a day celebrated around the world to commemorate the formation of a council of countries united in the fight for human rights. The Unitarian Universalist Association holds an office at the UN headquarters in New York (see photo above). The UU United Nations Office has been involved in drafting the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, leading the faith caucus to establish the International Criminal Court, working to overcome UN apathy about sexual orientation and gender identity issues, and providing strong leadership in all aspects of human rights at a policy level. The UU UNO promotes the goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all, as reflected in the United Nations Charter. Through targeted education, advocacy, and outreach, they engage Unitarian Universalists in support of international cooperation and the work of the UN.

River of Grass has a long history of supporting the UN through our UNICEF (United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund) campaign. This month, our children will engage in the UN Me religious education program to learn about the work of the United Nations and how our UU principles call us to work for global human rights. Additionally, on **Sunday, October 28**<sup>th</sup>, our children will be "trick or treating" through the sanctuary to collect your loose change (and bills) in their UNICEF collection boxes. However, boxes will be available for your donations all month during hospitality time –

no need to wait for the end of the month! Thank you in advance for supporting the work of the United Nations and the efforts of our children.

I hope to see many families at our Annual Picnic on **October 14<sup>th</sup>**. There will be lots of games and space to run – something we can't do at The River! Remember to wear your new gold River of Grass T-shirts. There are a few children's shirts available from me directly – let me know if you would like one.

## WHAT IS A MISSION STATEMENT AND WHY HAVE ONE? Scott May

A few years ago I had the pleasure of attending UU Leadership School at The Mountain in North Carolina. It was an uplifting and valuable learning experience - gaining insights from experienced UUA Congregational Staff who are devoted to assisting congregations like ours. One focus area was Mission Statements, sharing its purpose, examples, and best practices. They shared that a congregation's Mission Statement is one of the most important elements of a congregation, and that it should be at the heart and spirit of decision-making and annual budget drive. Here is a summary of what they shared.



A Mission Statement must:

- State why our congregation exists
- Express our deepest values and call us to our highest aspirations
- Be action oriented, must accomplish something

And in order for the Mission Statement to be at the heart of decision-making and the annual budget drive, it also must be:

- Simple, clear, and succinct
- Easily memorized, where members can recite it

They shared some example Mission Statements:

- Grow souls and heal the world
- Nurture your spirit, expand your mind, work for justice
- Love radically, serve gratefully, wonder daily

Here is our Mission Statement:

# *River of Grass is committed to healing injustice and creating a sustainable earth while honoring each individual's search for truth, meaning, and faith.*

Our Mission Statement successfully expresses why we exist, our deepest values, and our highest aspirations. Applying the learnings from the UUA Congregational Staff, our Mission Statement could be tweaked to be a little more action oriented, a bit more succinct, and easier to memorize – while maintaining what it successfully expresses, such as:

#### Heal injustice, create a sustainable earth, and honor everyone's search for meaning

This is not a recommendation, but merely an example of how the UUA recommendations could be applied.

Let's start the conversation and generate thoughtful discussion around our Mission Statement, encouraging members to share what feels right to them.

Wouldn't it be something if every member could recite our Mission Statement? Wouldn't it be valuable if we referred to it as we make decisions about how we spend our time, talent, and treasure?

Please notify Rita Cherubini at vicepresident@riverofgrassuu.org if you are interested in being actively involved in this important work, and being part of a 'Mission/Vision Working Group'. This working group will be charged with (a) leveraging the congregational input used to develop the strategy plan, (b) gaining additional congregational input, (c) developing a draft go-forward Mission Statement, and (d) presenting it for congregational discussion and approval at an upcoming 2019 congregational meeting.

Our Mission Statement is the cornerstone defining who we are, our deepest values, and our highest aspirations. As we move through the process of revisiting it, there is much gratitude for everyone's open mind, loving heart, and helping hands.

## VISION STATEMENT: TAKING A FRESH LOOK THE CURRENT, THE PAST AND THE FUTURE Rita Cherubini

Our Vision Statement articulates where we are going - our dreams for the future; where our Mission Statement presents who we are and what we are doing now. Our Vision Statement has been in effect from 2012 to 2017. If you were asked what's in it, could you answer? We don't see it very often; it's not posted anywhere to remind us of where we are going. Does it reflect your thinking? Here is our Vision Statement to refresh you or bring it forward to those who might not have seen it.

- Is a warm and welcoming spiritual home for all who enter our doors.
- We are known for our quality worship services and our diverse programs for adults and children.
- We promote connections with one another and the larger Unitarian Universalist community.

#### Our professional ministerial leadership

- Provides inspiration and guidance to our members and their families in the development of their own unique spiritual practices.
- Our lay leadership represents all of our membership and serves with love and enthusiasm.

#### Our members

- Commit to play active roles in our congregational life and to support our congregation financially.
- Join together in right relations to advocate for human rights and earth-friendly practices in our local, extended and global communities.

#### We invite seekers on spiritual journeys to join us!

On January 30, 2016, members joined together for a River of Grass Envisioning Day to review the accomplishments of our 2011-2016 five-year vision and build our next five-year vision, 2018-2023. Discussions focused around Membership, Professional and Lay Ministry, Adult and Children's Programming, ROG's Community Impact, Finances and a New Location. Out of this came some new thinking in a Strategic Plan, approved by the congregation at the Annual Meeting last May.

Here are some excerpts from the 2018 Strategic Plan: A New Vision:

Look to the children. They are the future. Over the years, we have taught our children that as Unitarian Universalists, we are identified by three tenets.

- We are the people with Open Minds, Loving Hearts, and Helping Hands.
- Everything we envision fits with these three tenets, which can serve as our end goal guideposts as we move in our future.
- The new five-year Strategic Plan Goals will be: To Love, To Learn, and To Lead...for ourselves, for our families, for our congregation, for our communities and for our world.

Launching this new Strategic Plan demonstrates that our congregation is moving forward beyond the Vision Statement of 2012-2017. Anyone interested in revisiting our Vision Statement is invited to be part of a 'Mission/Vision Working Group' to reflect on our past vision and match who we are today with our focus for tomorrow. It's critical that the vision represents our congregation. The Mission/Vision Working Group will review the congregational input used to develop the Strategy plan, gain additional input from the congregation, develop a draft going-forward Vision Statement, and present it at a 2019 congregational meeting for discussion and approval. 
- The whole family! Our pavilion is next to beautiful paths and a huge playground.

## MEMBERSHIP POLICY CHANGE Brit Lundell

At the previous Board of Trustees meeting, the Membership Committee proposed an addition to Policy 9, Membership. The policy change pertains to friends of the Congregation. In compliance with our Policy on Policies, the change is published below and will be approved or rejected at the Board meeting scheduled for October 17, 2018. If you have any questions or feedback in regard to the new policy, you are asked to direct your questions to Zena Tucker at membership@riverofgrassuu.org.

Add the following as a section under Policy 9, Membership:

Friend of the Congregation: A Friend of the Congregation is a person who is involved in the congregation but might not prefer to join. This includes:

- non-members who financially contribute
- parents of children enrolled in religious education
- former members who have moved away, but still retain a connection such as continuing to receive our weekly newsletter
- participants in outreach programs such as college campus group or military ministry group that the congregation sponsors.
- 1. Friends will be identified as such in the Congregational administrative database by the Office Administrator.
- 2. Friends will be solicited for financial pledging as part of the Annual Budget Drive.
- 3. Friends may be listed in an area of the Member Directory (but will have the same ability as members to opt out of being listed).
- 4. Friends will have access to the Member section of the website, but access to the Membership Directory information is limited to only the names, phone numbers, and email addresses of adult members and friends.

## UUA PRESIDENT JOINS FLORIDA UUS FOR ALL OUT ON AMENDMENT 4 – OCT. 20<sup>TH</sup> & 21<sup>ST</sup>

The UUA is partnering with UUs in Florida in our support of the Second Chances Coalition Amendment 4 that will extend the vote to over 1.4 million people in Florida with past convictions.

UUA President Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray will be coming to Florida to join a canvassing effort anchored by the UU Church of Sarasota on Saturday, Oct. 20<sup>th</sup>. We will gather there between 9:00 & 9:30 a.m. for a short program with Rev. Frederick-Gray and canvassing training with Second Chances Coalition organizer Ashley Green. Then we will head out to canvass around noon and reconvene at the church by 3 pm. (Lunch/snacks will be provided.)

On Sunday, Oct. 21st, Rev. Susan will be preaching at our UU congregation in Clearwater. A reception and phone bank will follow.

## CHOIR CORNER WHO ARE WE? Gayle Giese

ho are we? What do Unitarian Universalists believe? The answer can be found in our hymnals, which shows the history of how our faith developed, merged, changed, expanded. Look at the Contents of either hymnal to see that the songs are organized into sections representing Faith Traditions that guide us and offer us that wide palette that is Unitarian Universalism: Transcending

Mystery and Wonder, Words and Deeds of Prophetic People, Wisdom from the World's Religions, Jewish and Christian Teachings, Humanist Teachings, and Earth-Centered Traditions. This last one was added when *Singing the Journey* was created in 2005.

Ten River of Grass members (nine from the choir) attended Jason Shelton's inspiring music workshop at the UU Congregation of Miami on Saturday, 9/15. We learned how to show visitors Who We Are through our music, that it's in our traditions to sing the word "God" and to honor Earth-centered, Jewish, and world religions; to learn from the transcendentalists. Social justice has *always* been important to us.

Being aware that songs can alienate people who don't know them or if the songs are difficult to sing helps us to make thoughtful hymn choices to ensure that all feel welcomed. Linda Lathroum taught us that singing songs in one's native language is a deeper, more heartfelt experience for that person. Some songs push our buttons because of memories we've associated with them. We agreed that if someone feels angst during a particular song that it doesn't mean to nix the song, but rather to work through those feelings in blessed community. In fact, it becomes an opportunity for healing or growth.

You probably love some hymns and hate others! Yes, so it'd be great to have various styles at each service to offer something that speaks to each individual. These hymn types have functions within the service:

1.Shape Songs - they shape the message and usually have a lot of content and theology to discuss.


2. Thrust Songs – a shape song with a groove that really moves us forward.

3.Swing Songs - songs with a swing beat

4.Hang Songs – songs that "go deep" into our emotions; often repetitive, may be meditative. Think "Comfort Me" by Mimi Bornstein. These may be songs we sing to each other.

Learning the story behind the song – the how and the why and the when it was written – made the song have much greater meaning to me. Mimi wrote "Comfort Me" when her dad died. Holly Near wrote "We Are a Gentle, Angry People" after Harvey Milk was shot in San Francisco. The crowd sang it at the San Francisco courthouse. "We Would Be One" was written by the Liberal Religious Youth of the United States and Canada at their conference in 1953-4, setting a model for the Unitarian Universalist merger in 1961. Leave it to the youth to figure things out first!

Our singing together unlocks the key to being together in loving community, building relationships, healing hurts, feeling joy—when we show up! ## **PLANNED GIVING AT THE RIVER** Kip Barkley, Planned Giving Group

A t River of Grass, we have a Planned Giving Group comprised of Kip Barkley, Rick Tucker and Jacquie Velazquez. We report to the Finance Committee and then on to the Board. What is planned giving? First and foremost, planned giving is about getting your act together. Do you know where all your financial stuff is? Do you have a forgotten IRA still with a previous employer? Is there a financial account where you named a former spouse as beneficiary, for whom you no longer feel affection? Is there anyone else who should know where all your stuff is? Do you keep a list of your passwords? Everyone has a Last Will and Testament. If you do not write your own, the State of Florida has one in place for you. What do you want the court to do with your stuff, your legacy? This is the planning part of planned giving. Maybe you would even want some of your stuff to go to River of Grass, maybe as second in line behind another beneficiary, or first?



Planned Giving starts with a conversation. Perhaps we'll offer a workshop on money management. Perhaps you are interested in a workshop on wills? Your Planned Giving Group has many stories and suggestions. We encourage you to speak with your own legal and financial advisors. Planned gifts come from assets not income.

For a Will, the suggested wording to give to our UU community would be:

"I give and devise to the River of Grass Unitarian Universalist Congregation, Inc., a Florida not-for-profit corporation, the sum of \$\_\_\_\_\_."

or

"I give and devise to the River of Grass Unitarian Universalist Congregation Capital Fund, Inc., a Florida not-forprofit corporation, the sum of \$\_\_\_\_\_\_ specifically for the Legacy Fund."

Remember, it all starts with a conversation.

Mary White Ovington (1865 -1951): Civil Rights Activist. Suffragist. Pacifist. Advocate. Journalist. Author. These are just a few of the many hats Ovington wore during her life.

Mary White Ovington was born April 11, 1865, in Brooklyn, New York. Her

parents, members of the Unitarian Church, were supporters of women's rights and involved in the anti-slavery movement. This early introduction to activism provided Ovington with a foundation in social justice. Three issues seemed to be especially important to Ovington's work in the community: helping the poor, women's suffrage and civil rights. Ovington's activism helped to establish the Greenpoint Settlement, which provided shelter and services to those in need. Additionally, she was active in the early establishment and work of the National Negro Committee, which later organized the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).



## HEADS UP: THE COMMON READ IS ON THE EVENT HORIZON Susan Juncosa



**E** very year, the bUUkies sponsor a congregational event: the UUA Common Read. A Common Read invites participants in all UU congregations to read and discuss the same book in a given period of time. A Common Read can build community in our congregations and our movement by giving diverse people a shared experience, shared language, and a basis for deep, meaningful conversations. Each year, a committee including both headquarters and field staff of the UUA chooses the Unitarian Universalist Common Read. Anyone may nominate a book.

This year's selected book is *Justice on Earth: People of Faith Working at the Intersections of Race, Class, and Environment*, edited by Manish Mishra-Marzetti and Jennifer Nordstrom (Skinner House Books, 2018). At a time when racial justice, environmental justice, and economic justice are seen as issues competing for time, attention, and resources, *Justice on Earth* explores the ways in which the three are intertwined. Those on the margins are invariably those most affected by climate disaster and environmental toxins. The book asks us to recognize that our faith calls us to longhaul work for justice for our human kin, for the Earth and for all life. It invites us to look at our current challenges through a variety of different perspectives, offers tools to equip us for sustained engagement, and proposes multiple pathways for follow-up action.
