TRUST FALL **Rev. Amy Carol Webb**



ou know that familiar social experiment where person #1 stands behinds person #2, then person #1 holds out their arms and person #2 proves their trust in person #1 by falling backward expecting person #1 to catch them. You've probably done it at least a few times, if not many, depending on how many youth cons, theater camps, or other bonding retreats you've experienced. Hopefully you were caught. Perhaps at one time or another, you weren't.

Think for a moment where the focus was when you did this, or where you expect it might have been. To my memory, every time I was part of this game tremendous emphasis was placed on person #2, working with that person to help them learn to let go

of their natural self-protective reflexes, to have faith in the person behind them, to prove their ability, their willingness to override their instinct to protect themselves, and trust.

Perhaps it was different for you, but I don't remember all that much teaching about learning to be person #1. To be the one worthy of that trust.

Very often in religious community, we come through the doors as person #2, and likely one who suffered not being caught at some crucial time we had expected to be. We come longing to heal, thirsty for kindness, hungry for truth, seeking community, hoping for connection – and not yet able to trust. We come yearning to know we'll be caught when we fall, while expecting not to. It takes awhile to learn again, that trust. And some who, like me, experienced a version of expulsion from our religious origins - "disfellowship," "excommunication," "shunning," are some of the terms for this wounding – may never fully recover.



To help us envision our next home (after our lease ends in 3 years), we have invited Barry Finkelstein to spend Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, March 1-3 with us to conduct a New Home Envisioning program. Barry has been a Unitarian Universalist Congregational Stewardship Consultant since 2007, and has worked with over 60 UU congregations in all aspects of stewardship, governance, and planning. In addition, he is a professional management consultant with 35 years of experience supporting non-profits, US government agencies, and commercial firms.



Barry hopes to accomplish three goals during the visit:

- 1) gather enough information to gain a clear sense of who we are and where we would like to go;
- 2) generate specific observations and recommendations to help us on our journey; and
- 3) explain how the UUA Stewardship for Us Team can offer guidance and coaching as we move into the future.



FAITH DEVELOPMENT

Raising our daughters, we had one cardinal rule – no tattling to get your sister into trouble. Do tell if it will get her OUT of trouble, though! It was important to us that they grow up being each other's protectors. This didn't always make us popular, but as parents, one has to keep the end game in mind. We knew who we wanted them to become.

As we travel through this liturgical theme of being people of trust, I am reminded that parenting requires so much trust – trust in yourself, trust in your partner, and most certainly trust that your teens will hold onto some of the wisdom you did your best to fill them with as they make their way in the world. Our children know they can trust us to help with homework, take them to horseback riding lessons and attend dance recitals. Their academic, social and physical well-being is entrusted to us. But, it's easy to forget that we're also our children's primary religious educators. How they come to understand the world and their place in it comes from their parents, first and foremost. We are blessed with dedicated

Sunday school teachers here at The River, but how are you supporting their faith development at home? Here are some ideas to help you on that journey.

- ~refer to our Principles when sharing picture books
- ~take advantage of weekly Sunday school parent letters by scheduling suggested activities
- ~take time to reflect together on Sunday afternoons about the morning services
- ~hold weekly "Sabbath" dinners and light a family chalice
- ~attend mid-week spiritual practices together at The River
- ~spend time in nature, observing and marveling at the sights and sounds
- ~create "gift bags" for the homeless to keep in your car
- ~pause the television programming to talk about the choices the characters are making
- ~hang a UU Principles poster in your home (there are many at cafepress.org)

Developing spiritual practices as a family is a healthy way to manage stress and create peace in the home. If you feel that you need to build some of your UU knowledge base, consider attending our Faith Forward programs every other Sunday after service. Childcare can be provided, if needed. We also have a children's library in the Faith Development hallway. There are wonderful storybooks to be found there. Simply leave me a note so I know who borrowed what.



This month the Faith Development Committee will be revisiting our Faith Development Mission and Ministry Statements, which haven't been updated in many years. WHAT IS MUSIC MINISTRY? Gayle Giese



e need to sing and make music in the same way that we need to breathe really deeply; it is healing and rejuvenating. I've had a cold and sore throat so I've endured several days without singing, and that just doesn't feel right! Singing provides resilience against hard times. Music connects us with our emotions, allowing us to work through them, release them, and move back into joy. When I sing with others, we are connected in our shared breathing, our sounds, and our souls. When I play or sing upbeat songs with the band at River of Grass, it's joyful and FUN! When the music promotes a positive message, such as peace in the world, the musicians are connected further by this mission, to enhance or spread our message with the congregation, community, and world.

Our River of Grass music ministry has ministered to me, congregants, choir members, other musicians, and people at rallies and concerts we've done. Each year, at the Martin Luther King Day march, Rev. Amy leads justice marching songs, much like the songs sung on the civil rights marches from Selma to Montgomery in 1965, songs like "Keep Your Eyes on the Prize" and "Guide My Feet" to help the people keep walking and not give up despite exhaustion, fear of violence, hunger, and thirst.

Music at River of Grass may be entertaining, but that's not the primary intent. Musicians who are ministering through music are more like paramedics, social workers, doctors, and therapists than entertainers. This past Sunday, one congregant said, "I felt embraced by the choir's music." That is the goal. We are trying to heal, to embrace, to enhance or enlighten the message. Perhaps our music can help mend broken hearts, bend the arc toward justice, and, as so eloquently written by Lao-Tse, bring peace to our hearts, homes, neighbors, cities, and nations.





Once he brought some of them into the group. Right after I finished the bamboo chancel wall we needed a focal point for it, so I asked him to carve a wooden River of Grass chalice to go on it. The chalice we have today is what he created for us. It is magnificent.

When he served on the Board he went to the weeklong leadership school, SUULE Southern UU Leadership Experience.

FRANCES ELLEN WATKINS HARPER (1825 – 1911): abolitionist, suffragist, poet, teacher, public speaker, writer

Porn free in Baltimore, Maryland, she had a long and prolific career, publishing her first book of poetry at the age of 20, making her one of the first African-American published writers. Her impressive activist contributions includes becoming the first woman to teach sewing at the Union Seminary, assisting escaped slaves along the Underground Railroad, joining the Anti-Slavery Society and Women's Christian Temperance Union, and being considered "the mother of African-American journalism."

Harper founded, supported and held high office in several national progressive organizations. During Reconstruction she was an activist for civil rights, women's rights, and educational opportunities for all. In 1883 she became superintendent of the Colored Section of the Philadelphia and Pennsylvania Women's Christian Temperance Union. In 1894 she helped found the National Association of Colored Women and served as its vice president.
