THIS IS OUR GREAT PROMISE

Love is the spirit of this congregation and service is its law.
This is our great covenant: to dwell together in peace, to seek the truth in love, and to help one another.

El Amor es el espíritu de esta congregación. El servicio su ley principal. Esta es nuestra gran promesa: Vivir juntos en paz, buscar la verdad a través del amor, Y ayudarnos mutuamente.

Every Sunday here at River of Grass, we repeat together in unison this covenant written by the Unitarian minister, James Vila Blake (1842-1925), while he served the congregation in Evanston, Illinois, just before the turn of the last century.

This covenant. This promise we say aloud together. This vow we make for ourselves and with one another. This aspiration we would speak into being by the very power of our voices – and make real with our lives.

What is covenant, and what does it mean to us as Unitarian Universalists and members of the Beloved Community at River of Grass? What does it mean that Unitarian Universalism is a "covenantal religion," and that we re-affirm our covenant every time we gather? Some mistakenly presume "covenant" means "contract" – that it commands adherence rather than invites belonging, that it confirms transactions rather than affirms relations. While some fear that covenant enforces conformity, the Reverend Victoria E. Safford, Unitarian Universalist minister and poet insists, rather, that covenants are "declarations of interdependence."

A covenant is not a contract. It is not made and signed and sealed once and for all, sent to the attorneys for safekeeping or guarded under glass in a museum. A covenant is not a static artifact and it is not a sworn oath: Whereas, whereas, whereas. . . . Therefore, I will do this, or I'll die, so help me God. A covenant is a living, breathing aspiration, made new every day. It can't be enforced by consequences, but it may be reinforced by forgiveness and by grace, when we stumble, when we forget, when we mess up.*

Our Unitarian Universalist faith requires no creed – we bind ourselves to one another in love and service. Traveling the path of hope together, we cannot see whether the way will

FROM THE PRESIDENT "TO LOVE ANOTHER PERSON IS TO SEE THE FACE OF GOD" Scott May

I recently attended a Les Misérables performance at Broward Center and was struck by the words "To love another person is to see the face of God", written by Victor Hugo in the 1860s. These words have lingered with me for weeks, as I ponder the literal and implied meaning. And then I ponder why I keep pondering....

You may know that I was raised UU, and the word "God" has not been a typical part of my conscience nor vocabulary. I'm not a devout atheist, I just don't feel a connection to God nor a need. Yet, Victor Hugo's phrase struck me. What do these words tell me.... about life, about love,

about each other, about myself?

Assuming for a moment that God is real, if I could see the face of God, what would the experience be like? How would it feel? Would thunder sound? Would tremors roll through my body? Would I be in awe?

Even as a non-believer, just the thought "to see the face of God" is intriguing, and consuming.



Hugo's words link "seeing the face of God" to something easier for me to understand: loving another person. Wow, could something as simple as loving another be as powerful, as impactful, as inspiring as seeing the face of God? And if so, what type of love is Hugo referring to? Love between partners? Love between parent and child? Love between friends? Love of pets? Love of faith? As I reflect, I'm feeling that Hugo is referring to all forms of love. Any, every, and all.

Whenever we love another, we give of ourselves in a selfless compassionate way. And when we offer our love to another, Hugo is telling us that we are reaching the pinnacle of life ... our highest aspiration ... heaven on earth. And I believe this extends to our love for River of Grass – our mission, our worship services, and the good work we do together. And that feels transformational.

May we all be encouraged to love, to love unconditionally, and to love more. And may the love we share enable us to reach the pinnacle of life, and our highest aspiration.



Getting to Know UU's

FAMOUS UNITARIAN Kathy Jens-Rochow

LOUISA MAY ALCOTT (1832-1888) WRITER, ABOLITIONIST, ACTIVIST



"Let my name stand among those who are willing to bear ridicule and reproach for the truth's sake, and so earn some right to rejoice when the victory is won."

Louisa May Alcott was an American writer who authored over 30 books and short-story collections and wrote poetry as well. Little Women, her most famous book, was a novel for girls. Written in 1868, it departed from the existing practice of idealized and/or stereotypical children in books meant for young readers. Instead, it offered a fully realized young heroine in the spirited character of tomboy Jo March. Little Women remains a beloved classic of children's literature today. Alcott is also remembered for her book Hospital Sketches, which she penned in 1863 based on letters she had written home while serving as a nurse in Washington, D.C., She contracted typhoid fever and was treated with mercury, which affected her for the rest of her life, causing pain, weakness and hallucinations.

Another side of Louisa May Alcott is a much more complex and interesting figure. To earn a living, she penned—under a pseudonym—lurid and even racy stories with titles like "Pauline's Peril and Punishment" for popular magazines. In addition, she wrote serious novels for adults. But she was also a lifelong advocate for social reform, championing abolitionism as well as women's rights. She was the first woman to register to vote in Concord, MA.

In addition, he writes and records custom songs for clients and uses his recording studio to produce other artists. A truly independent musician, Dave's career is varied

and never predictable.



MARIA RIVAS

"I am a miracle of science and of faith"

A lmost 30 years ago I found myself trying to thrive in a developing country as the mother of 2 young daughters. The pollution, crime, traffic, drugs and corruption in Caracas, Venezuela in 1990 were daunting. One night, however, something happened that changed not only my attitude toward Venezuela, but, as it turned out, it changed the rest of my life.

Ken and I went to a concert in Caracas' premier concert theater to hear a famous Cuban troubadour. The opening act was a last-minute substitution, and as we waited for the concert to begin, we picked up on the buzz and anticipation. Maria Rivas was introduced – her 1st major concert –to a standing ovation! She then proceeded to blow us away. Through our then basic Spanish we could understand she was singing about crime, poverty, pollution, drugs, corruption. She repeated, "Y por eso quiero hablar," (that's why I want to speak...) and "hasta cuando ya no aguanto" (roughly, how long are we going to put up with this?) and then went on to call for unity and democracy, peaceful change and compassion. This young, beautiful mix of Barbra Streisand and Joan Baez, spoke about what I was feeling, and I instantly felt connected. Ken and I became huge fans, going to every appearance she made. When we finally met, Maria was excited to have such passionate 'gringo' fans. Our friendship was instant and profound.

Our life-long journey together was underway. The next year, the lead single of Maria's second CD went to the top of the charts. MANDUCO turned Maria, a Latin jazz singer, into a household name and eventually a cultural icon in Venezuela. She continued building her career, while also visiting us for extended periods in each of our homes. Eventually both Ken and I began to work with her professionally. What a great privilege that was!

When we first met Maria in 1991, Venezuela, despite its disorder, was relatively stable and prosperous. After the Chavez dictatorship took power in 1998, Venezuela's young democracy was destroyed, and civil liberties disappeared. Maria saw professional opportunities disappearing for those not aligned with "the revolution." In 2010, Maria sadly left Venezuela to continue her career elsewhere. Over the next 10 years she moved between South Florida, Europe and Asia, always in her heart, profoundly sad for having left her beloved Venezuela.

Over her career, Maria released 11 solo CDs and collaborated on many more. She sang in Spanish, Portuguese, and English, enchanting audiences wherever she performed. The elegance of her interpretation of lyrics, her vocal range, and the pure love she transmitted were simply irresistible. She was also a talented artist, with her own distinctive style, which she called 'curvismo.' Her paintings and drawings can be found in private collections on four continents. In 2013, Maria was named the Latin Grammy's Visual Artist of the Year. Her last CD, 'Motivos,' was nominated for a Latin Grammy in 2018. We had plans for much more music.

But in January 2013 Maria was diagnosed with an aggressive form of breast cancer which quickly metastasized. Over the next 6½ years she bravely fought it, even becoming "cancer free" for several years. Unfortunately, the cancer returned with a vengeance in late 2018. She received treatment in Spain and South Florida. Sadly she passed away surrounded by friends at Kendall's Baptist Hospital at 19:19 (7:19 pm) on 19 September 2019. Ken and I mourn her loss each and every day. She was a true inspiration, a source of love and beauty and the most unbelievable creativity and music. Until her death, she continued to draw, even while in ICU. It was as if she was driven to give back until she just couldn't any more. Until her last breath, Maria was the most generous, positive, humble, creative and loving friend we could possibly imagine.

Maria was raised in the Catholic faith, which gave her great comfort until her death. But she was also a Universalist, sharing Shinto, Hindu, and Buddhist beliefs as well. She was a member of River of Grass from 2014-2016. She loved the people of River of Grass, calling us always the people of Shangri-La. Every day she thanked Ken and me for taking her in and caring for her in her darkest and most difficult moments. I always told her that we were simply living our Unitarian Universalist faith, where love comes before all else. We will always treasure our time with her. QEPD, vuela con los ángeles, amada Mariasunción.




The Faith Forward Inquirers
