NEW HOME ENVISIONING Scott May

A New Home Envisioning meeting was held after service on 4/28/2019, with 20-30 members present at any given time. The participants reviewed the UUA Consultant Report recommendations: "River of Grass is ready to move toward a successful relocation effort and capital campaign to finance the investment in a new facility."

Participants identified New Home needs (in addition to everything we have at River of Grass), in priority order:

- Bigger Space (square footage)
- ♦ Outdoor Space (natural)
- ♦ Location Accessibility (close to major roads, easy to find, safe, central, visibility)

Eight New Home options were reviewed, and participants identified these top priority options for further research:

- Buy a building (possibly large enough to become a landlord)
- Stay here (possibly expanding into more space at our current location)

Participants also felt we should explore opportunities with:

- ◆ TAO Center (Jewish organization that rents from us)
- UUCFL (UU Congregation in east Fort Lauderdale)

A team is in place to research and discern New Home options, with the goal of sharing details with the congregation next fall. Thank you to the team!

Getting to Know UU's



RACHEL CARSON (1907-1964)

UNITARIAN, MARINE BIOLOGIST, WRITER AND ENVIRONMENTAL ACTIVIST

R achel Carson was born on a family farm near Springdale, Pennsylvania where she spent considerable time exploring the land. An avid reader, she began writing stories (often involving animals) at age eight and had her first story published at age ten.

Perhaps the finest nature writer of the Twentieth Century, Carson is remembered today as the woman who challenged the notion that humans could obtain mastery over nature with chemicals. Her sensational book, *The Silent Spring*, warned of the dangers to all-natural systems from the misuse of chemical pesticides such as DDT. Her actions raised the awareness about climate change, rising sea-levels, melting Arctic glaciers and many other interconnected environmental changes.

"Underlying all of these problems of introducing contamination into our world is the question of moral responsibility – responsibility not only to our own generation to those of the future."

FRIENDLINESS, MINISTER, AND MUSIC KEEP 'EM COMIN' Gayle Giese, Choir Director



The UU Association of Membership Professionals say that after Friendliness, the Minister and the Music (in that order) are the top reasons that visitors return to a congregation. I also read that innovation is essential to grow membership. With innovation in mind, let's take a moment to consider music ministry at the River.

Our Music Ministry Statement:

- To select quality, appropriate, and relevant music, presented with excellence.
- ♦ To involve all who are interested in order to enhance the worship service, touch hearts, and deliver the message in a way that words alone cannot.

At the River, we are blessed with many excellent musicians, but who coordinates and connects them, creating vibrant ensembles to make *every* worship service unforgettable?

How do we involve and welcome everyone that wants to participate in our music ministry, including our children, young adults and people of all abilities? How do we advertise our music and how do we attract more musicians, including choristers?

The UUA supplies short descriptions to clarify staff positions:

- ♦ The Music Director (or Dir. of Music Ministry) directs the music program, usually in consultation with the minister, and has overall accountability for the program. Responsible for program administration, including budget. May supervise other music staff. Personally, or through others, organizes and directs the choir(s), selects the music for worship, plays the organ or other instruments. May engage other musicians and supervise their performance. Typically, has at least one degree in Music.
- The **Choir Director** directs the choirs and/or other vocal groups. Often works under a music director. (I am your ½-time Choir Director.)
- ♦ The Organist/Keyboardist/Instrumentalist accompanies the choir during services, plans keyboard music, and also performs as a solo musician. May be responsible for maintenance and repair of instruments. Usually works in concert with a music director. (Brenda Parker is our principal pianist. I play once a month, and Anne Smith substitutes.)





With these descriptions in mind, how could we grow music ministry, which would increase joy in worship *and* membership at River of Grass? Linda Lathroum and I will be attending the AUUMM (Association for Unitarian Universalist Music Ministries) Convention in July and we will ponder this question and discuss with others and with you. We look forward to sharing some new innovative ideas!

THE RIVER OF GRASS CHOIR VISITS LIFENET4FAMILIES Gayle Giese

In his poem "Beyond Borders," Rick Hoyt writes, "Go forth, into the anxiety and sadness and loneliness and strangeness of some other place. WITNESS IN HOMESTEAD ON FATHERLESS FATHER'S DAY JUNE 16.

This Father's Day there will be thousands of teens at the Immigration Detention Center in Homestead who will be without parents, grandparents or anyone to give them love and a hug. This is the result of our government's cruel, mean-spirited policy of taking children away from families seeking asylum at the US border, combined with the practice of grabbing teenagers who've crossed the border in an attempt to be united with loved ones already here, and sending them to private, for-profit detention centers like the one run by Caliburn Corporation in Homestead, Florida.

The government's motive is to discourage other immigrants from coming to the US for help. The Caliburn Corporation's purpose in delaying the reunification of these children with loving families awaiting them seems to stem from the fact that it makes millions of dollars a day in profit, paid by the government from our taxes, for imprisoning these children as long as possible.

Since February, thoughtful people have been maintaining a daily vigil outside the walls of this children's prison asking that it be closed down and that the children be immediately reunited with their families. They call out to the children over the wall and hold up signs of love the children can see.

More than three hundred people – largely from religious institutions including UU from around the state and around the country – protested this cruel imprisonment of children for profit on Mother's Day. The Interfaith vigil and march on Father's Day, June 16 promises to be bigger. Sign up at coffee hour to join the Witness. We will rent a bus or van. Rev. Amy is joining us.

Welcome to the second email in a new series of UUA thought leadership messages sent monthly to all UU congregations and leaders to strengthen our connections and support shared learning. Enjoy!

Dear Congregation Members,

The UUA's annual congregational certification is in! Every year, congregations report their membership, religious education (RE) enrollment, budgetary figures, and much more. It's a helpful snapshot of what's happening in our congregations. And here's this year's headline: membership is steady, while religious education enrollment and average Sunday attendance continue to fall.

Adult membership is steady overall, coming in at 154,704, almost identical to last year. We have stabilized a downward trend in membership that had run 2010-2017, but beneath the headline we see substantial movement in membership figures in congregations. Last year 43% of congregations grew their adult membership, and 30% grew their RE enrollment. Growth is coming largely from our smallest congregations – of the almost 400 members we added to brick and mortar UUA congregations last year, 70% were from congregations of under 150 members. Regionally there is also some variation. The Central East, New England and Southern Regions grew this past year, and the Southern Region in particular has been a source of growth over the past five years.

So, what do these numbers mean; what's going on here? First, it's important to note that Unitarian Universalists, like many faith communities, continue to be impacted by the tide moving away from religious involvement in the United States. We see this in the generational shifts in RE enrollment. And the fact that we are not losing members at the rate of some of our mainline Christian cousins attests to the relevance of Unitarian Universalism in our time, as we tread water against the current trends.

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It's also important to acknowledge that the transition to the new formula for the Annual Program Fund, asking congregations to contribute to the UUA based on their ability to pay rather than their members, means we are not penalizing congregations for membership. The regions that grew this past year are the ones who have fully implemented the formula, and the remaining two regions – Pacific Western and MidAmerica – will complete their transition to the new formula next year.

Most importantly, what I see is that there is still a hunger for the values of justice, equity, compassion and liberation to which our faith aspires. Advancing these values matters far more than any simple statistics can capture. As we have engaged at a deeper level in the past two years in examining how systems of oppression have shaped our own UU institutions, we have not seen big changes in our membership, implying most folx are staying in the conversation. There is much more work to do to build "the power of we" in Unitarian Universalism, and I am glad to be on the journey.
